# Budget Considerations

- Exceed Maintenance of Effort funding for Charles County Public schools
- Supports Public Safety
- Commissioner Goals and Objectives
- Employee compensation
- Feedback from engaging the community and budget equity tool
- No property or income tax rate increases
- Utilize cash reserves to minimize budget impacts and support one-time costs

## State Cost Shifts of \$6.1 million:

- A nearly \$2 million increase over the FY2026 adopted budget, reflecting a 48.4% increase.
- Pension Cost Shift: \$3,900,900
  - *Includes Board of Education, College of Southern Maryland and the Library*
- Private Pre-K: \$655,600
  - *Funding included in County Government budget*
- State Department of Assessment and Taxation: \$1,500,000
  - *County share 90%*

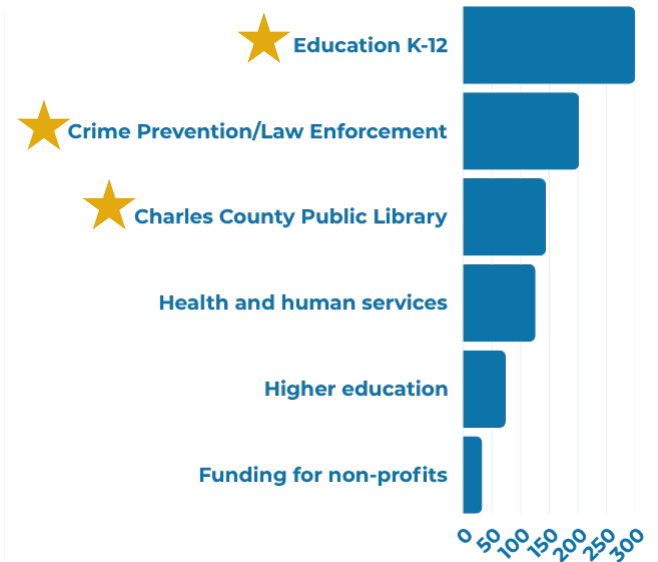

# Budget Feedback: Open-Ended Comments

52% of participants provided feedback on the FY2027 budget. Below are the identified themes:



## Support and Concern for Education

- Strong demand to fully fund Charles County Public Schools (CCPS)
- Concerns about:
  - Teacher pay and retention
  - Overcrowded classrooms
  - Loss of funding share over time
  - Lack of resources and supplies



## Public Safety and Emergency Services

- Strong concern about EMS staffing shortages and response capacity
- Mixed but generally supportive views on law enforcement funding
- Rising concern about crime trends



## Infrastructure Strain & Growth Concerns

- Widespread perception that growth is outpacing infrastructure
- Strong opposition to continued residential development without capacity improvements
- Traffic congestion and road conditions
- Water/sewer capacity concerns
- Hospital and healthcare capacity
- “Stop building” sentiment



## Tax Burden & Government Spending Concerns

- Strong resistance to tax increases
- Calls for:
  - Efficiency
  - Reduced spending
  - Accountability
- Property tax concerns
- Opposition to “wasteful spending” or “pet projects”
- Skepticism about government growth and staffing
- Desire for audits and performance reviews

# Budget Feedback: Open-Ended Comments

52% of participants provided feedback on the FY2027 budget. Below are the identified themes:



## Growth vs. Quality-of-Life Tradeoff

- Concern that development is:
  - Reducing green space
  - Increasing congestion
  - Changing community character
- Environmental protection (water, forests)
- Overdevelopment (housing, commercial)
- Lack of community planning
- Desire for balanced growth



## Economic Development & Jobs

- Desire to reduce “bedroom community” status
- Support for attracting businesses—but with caution
- Need for local jobs
- Mixed views on data centers
- Support for small/local businesses
- Commercial vacancies vs. new construction










## Recreation, Youth, and Community Services

- Demand for more activities for youth and families
- Recreation seen as preventative (reduces crime, improves well-being)
- Lack of teen activities
- Need for community spaces (“third places”)
- Libraries and arts funding
- After-school programs and transportation

# County Operating Revenues vs. Budget Requests

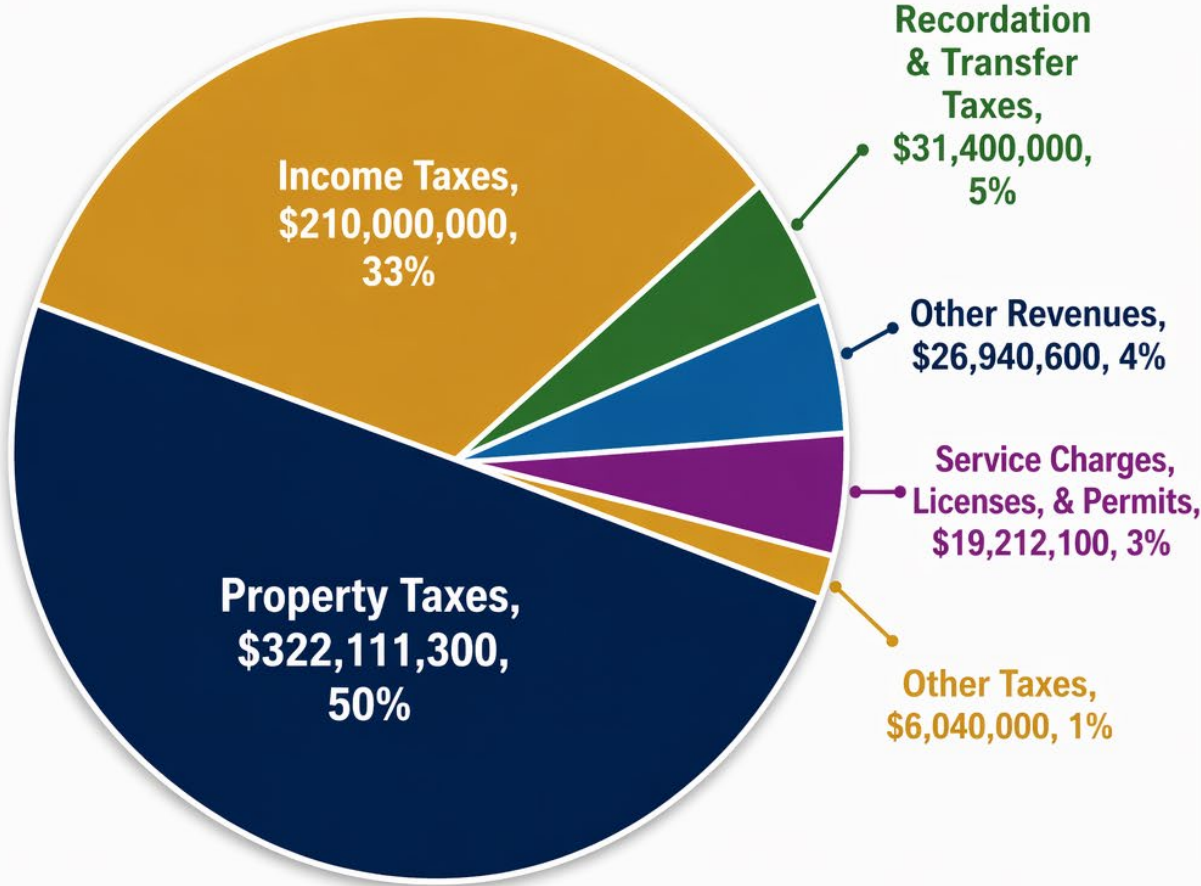
- \$42.5 million increase in operating revenues.
  - Growth in property assessments at current property rate
  - Adjustment in other revenues to current trends
- \$62.5 million increase in requested expenses.
  - \$15.6 million request from Board of Education
  - \$32.2 million request from Departments/Agencies
  - \$14.7 million request from Charles County Sheriff's Office
- Requests are outpacing revenues

# Revenue Highlights

- No property tax or income tax rate increases
  - 13<sup>th</sup> year in a row these tax rates have remained the same
- Income tax budget growth – 13.8%, \$25.5 million
- Property tax budget growth – 5.5%, \$16.9 million
- Adjusting tax differential for towns at calculated rate
- No changes to recordation or transfer tax rate
- Other Taxes includes increase in Highway User Tax Revenues due to State forecast
- Interest Income decrease due to earning lower interest rates on its investments

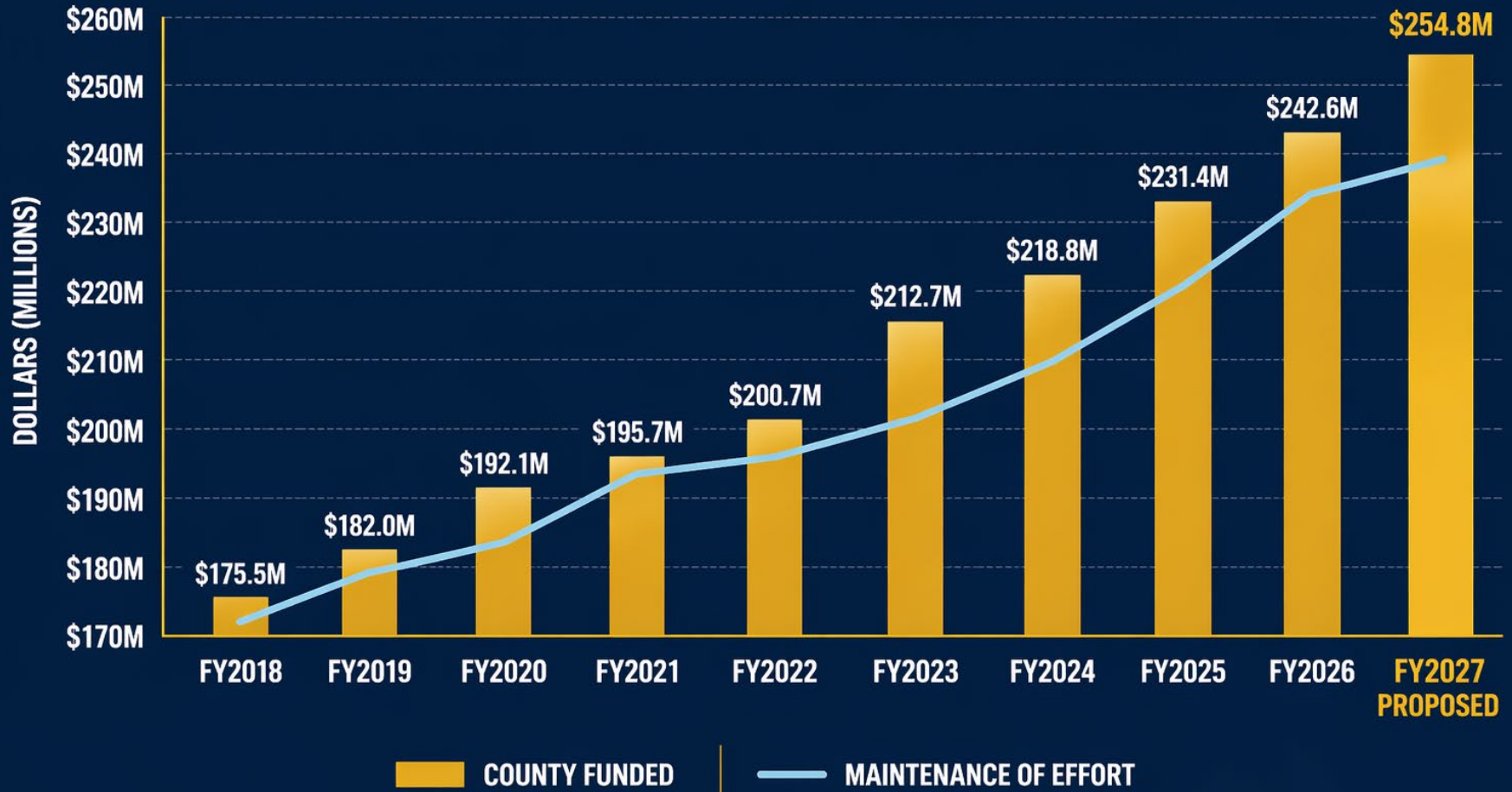

# What's in the Proposed Budget?

- Board of Education budget provides an increase of \$12,138,500
  - Supports salary increases for collective bargaining
  - Mandatory health care costs, central office courier vans, negotiated school bus contractor wages, and replacement of retiring buses, and special education funding,
  - Funds BOE request for instructional supplies
- Exceeds Maintenance of Effort by \$14.7 million

# What's in the Proposed Budget?

- Sheriff's Office
  - Funding to support pending collective bargaining agreements with Sworn Officers and Correctional Officers
  - Five (5) new positions: Technical Surveillance Specialist, Detention Center Standards and Accreditation Specialist, Criminal Justice Instructor, Civilian Recruiter, and a Systems Analyst. Grade enhancement for the Forensic Science Section
  - License plate reader system and a drone first responder
  - Support for the youth engagement program
  - Bearcat armored vehicle
  - Replacement of capital equipment

# What's in the Proposed Budget?

- All County Administered Departments
  - Implementation of the classification and compensation study
  - Salary increases for eligible employees on their anniversary date
  - Fully funding pension contributions
  - Supports future retiree healthcare

# What's in the Proposed Budget?

- Emergency Services

- Seven (7) new positions to support the new Animal Care Center.
  - Two (2) Animal Care Technicians, two (2) Animal Care Clerks, two (2) Animal Care Attendants, and one (1) Animal Care Support Specialist
- Addition of six (6) EMTs
- One (1) additional Deputy Director of Emergency Services and one (1) new Financial Administrator position
- One (1) new ambulance
- Lift assistance for non-Waldorf residents
- A qualitative fit testing machine for non-full-face respirators
- Continued funding for Mobile Integrated Health Program, paid Paramedic program & Cadet Academy

# What's in the Proposed Budget?

- Recreation, Parks, and Tourism:
  - One-time funds in support of a concert
  - One (1) new Outreach Specialist position
  - Part time funding to support expanded hours at the indoor pools
  - Funding to support CPR training for staff
  - Equipment purchases needed to maintain the parks throughout the County and a new grapple truck
  - Funds for aluminum picnic tables to replace wooden ones and for two metal buildings to replace old sea containers
  - One-time funding to support a MACo booth at their summer conference

# What's in the Proposed Budget?

- Fiscal and Administrative Services:
  - Funding for various equipment and software needs
  - Support of County Departments
    - Government Experience Agent program for Commissioners' Office
    - Citian (traffic) software and Rental Licensing Software for PGM
    - ChatGPT licenses
    - Munis access review

# What's in the Proposed Budget?

- Planning and Growth Management:
  - Continues support of the Rental Registry Program. Seven (7) new positions for this program:
    - Six (6) Code Compliance Inspectors
    - One (1) Inspector Technician
  - Funding for a water and sewer ordinance update

# What's in the Proposed Budget?

- Public Works:
  - Establishes an operating budget for the future Sports and Wellness Center to support operating and maintenance of the facility
  - Increases for contract personnel to support increases to the County's snow removal contracts
  - Replacement equipment/vehicles

# What's in the Proposed Budget?

- Community Services:
  - One (1) new Aging Services Administrator position
  - Continues to support the Summer Youth Program
  - Software license to track performance measures
- Human Resources:
  - Increases to countywide employee training
  - Continues to fund the County's intern program

# What's in the Proposed Budget?

- Economic Development
  - Provides funds for marketing services for on-going website support and additional marketing initiatives to support the tech corridor and social media support
  - Partnership with Small Business Development Center
- Contingency
  - A reserve is included in the proposed budget for emergencies and potential loss of grant funding

# What's in the Proposed Budget?

- Other Agencies:
  - College of Southern Maryland: Funds the requested budget
  - Health Department: Funds the requested budget
  - Library: Budget increase in support of operations; salary increases to their employees
  - Election Board: Funding to support upcoming election year; pollbooks and new voting system
  - Charitable Trust: supports non-profit grant awards and operating costs

# What's in the Proposed Budget?

- State's Attorney's Office:
  - Increasing operating costs to meet demands
- Circuit Court
  - One (1) new Court Social Worker position
  - Increase in contract services for the annual support of the kiosk machines and for annual services with security vendor for maintenance of security equipment



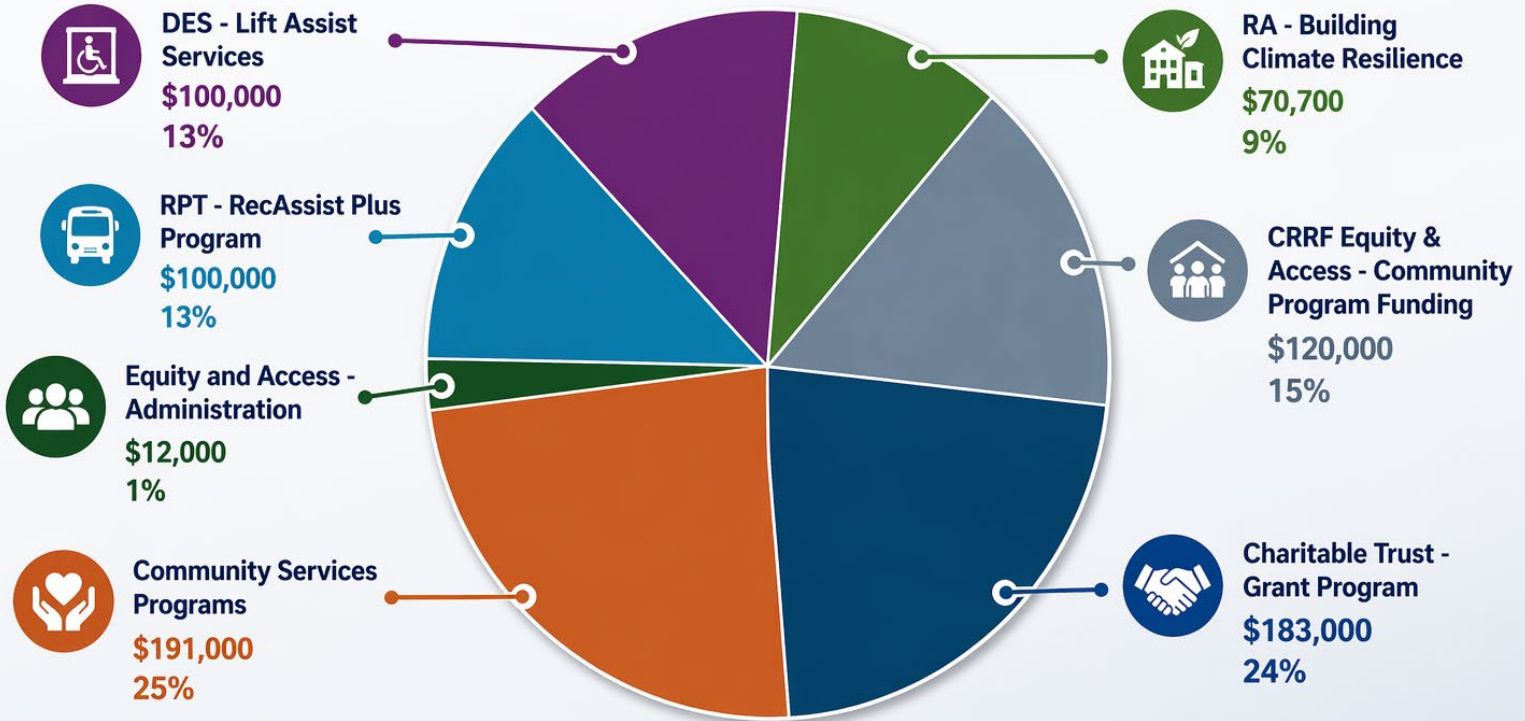

# What is the CRRF?

- Maryland state initiative established following the legalization of adult-use recreational cannabis in 2022.
- Allocates a portion of the tax revenue from cannabis sales to local jurisdictions to support community-based initiatives aimed at benefiting low-income communities and those disproportionately affected by past cannabis prohibition enforcement.

# What's in the CRRF Proposed Budget?

- Funding for The Charles County Charitable Trust to award grants to local non-profits through a grant program.
  - These grants will support low-impact and disproportionately impacted communities in the Waldorf region of Charles County.
- Funding for the Department of Community Services for senior meals in the Waldorf region of Charles County and expands the Summer Youth Employment Program.
- Funding for the Department of Emergency Services to support lift assist services in the Waldorf region

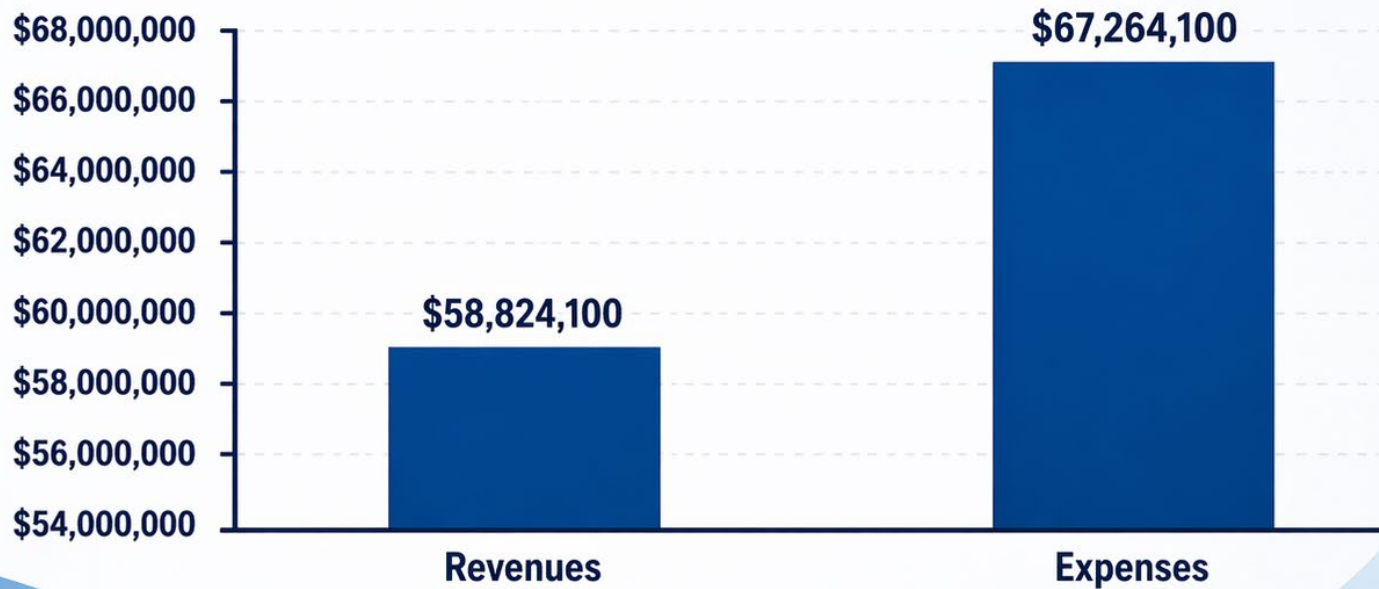

## WATER AND SEWER OPERATING BUDGET



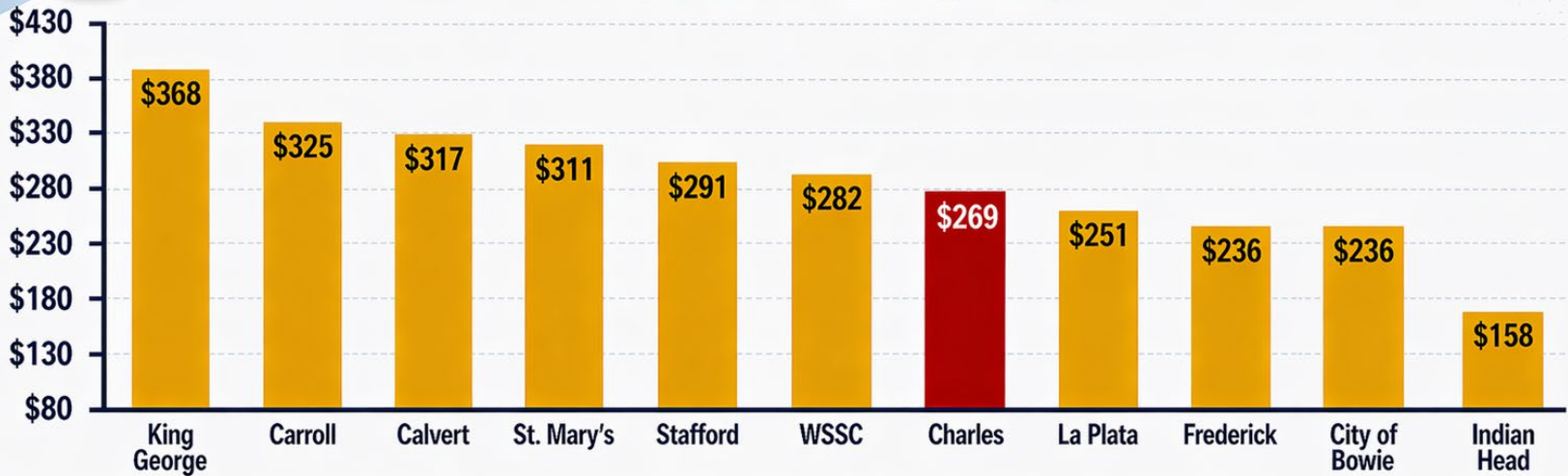
# Water and Sewer Fund

- A rate increase of approximately 9.4% on the average quarterly bill is recommended to balance the budget
- What is causing the rate increase?
  - Meter replacements and associated costs
  - Costs associated with new mandatory regulatory compliance for lead, copper, and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS)
  - Increase in salaries and fringe benefits which includes the addition of 11.3 new positions to support operations
  - Increase for anticipated equipment repairs and maintenance, as well as capital maintenance
  - Increase in debt service to support water and sewer capital projects

The average residential user utility bill is currently **\$246** per quarter.



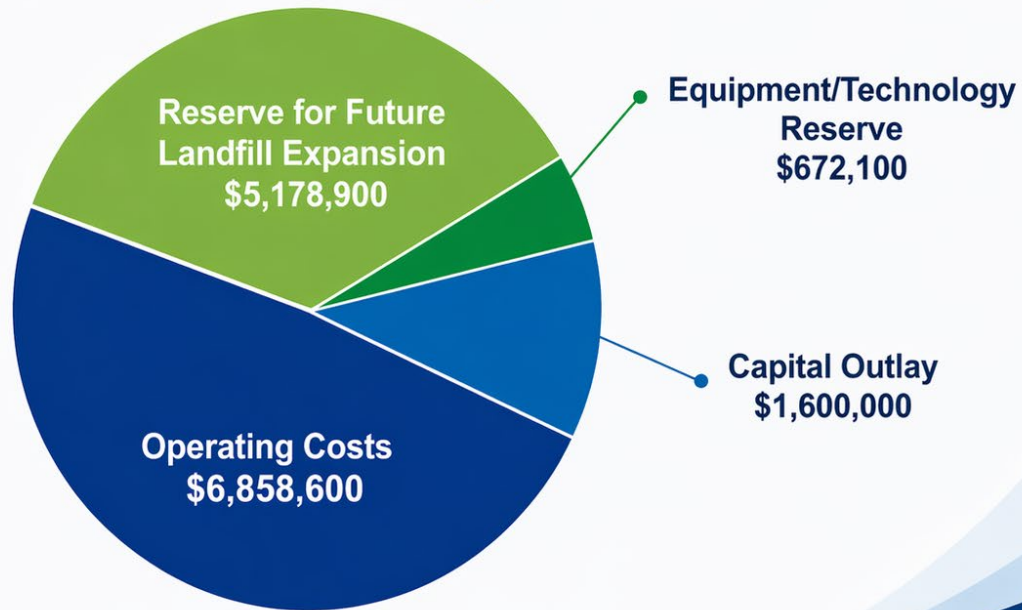

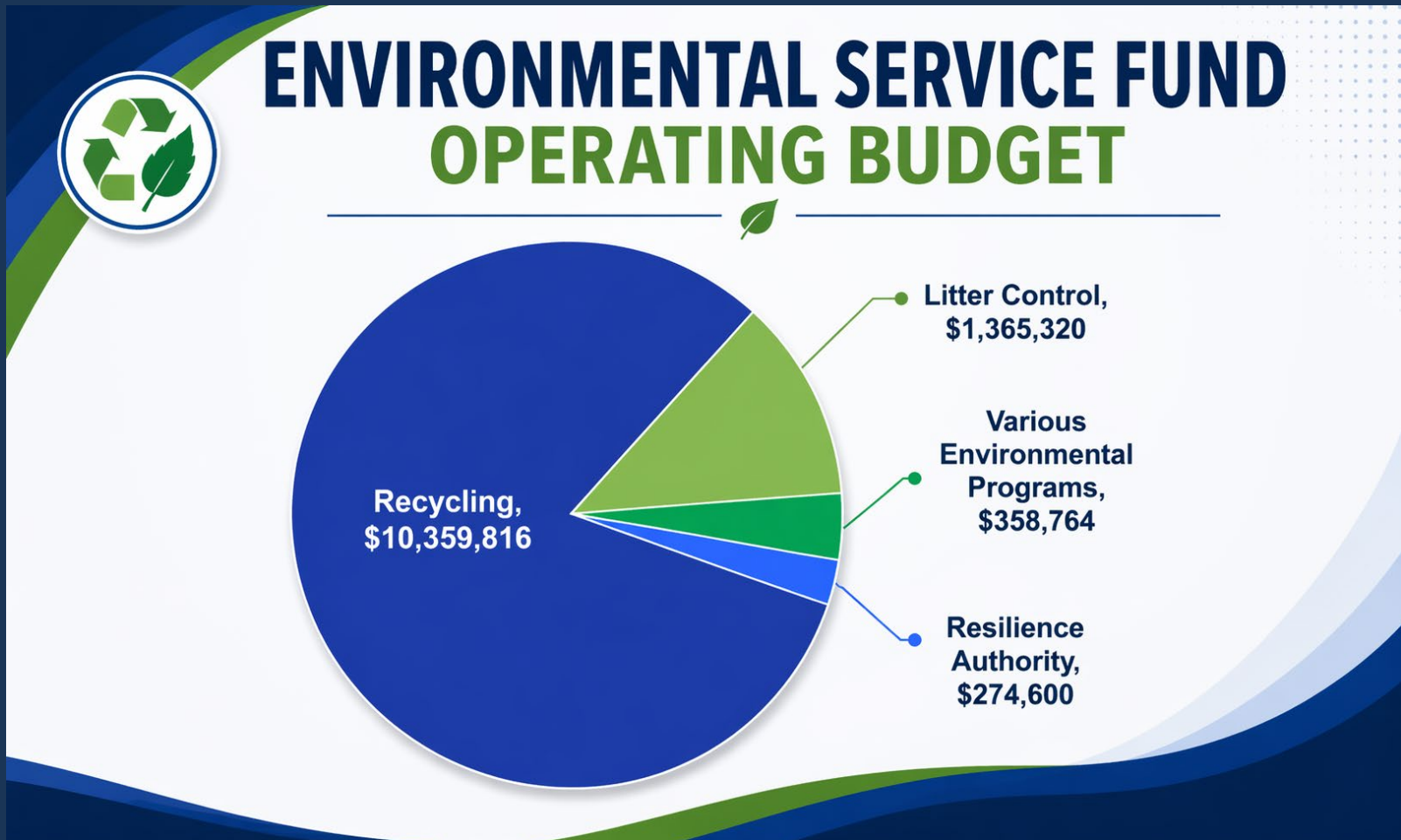


# Landfill Fund

- Recommending a \$10 increase to the current tipping fee of \$108 per ton to \$118 per ton.
  - Proposed Budget includes:
    - New and replacement equipment to maintain a safe and productive Landfill
    - Permitting and engineering costs necessary for the landfill vertical expansion.
    - New DPW position: Full-time Facilities Assistant Scale House Manager
    - Increase in operation and maintenance costs.
    - Landfill Expansion/Closure Cost increase for future development of the remaining space at the landfill

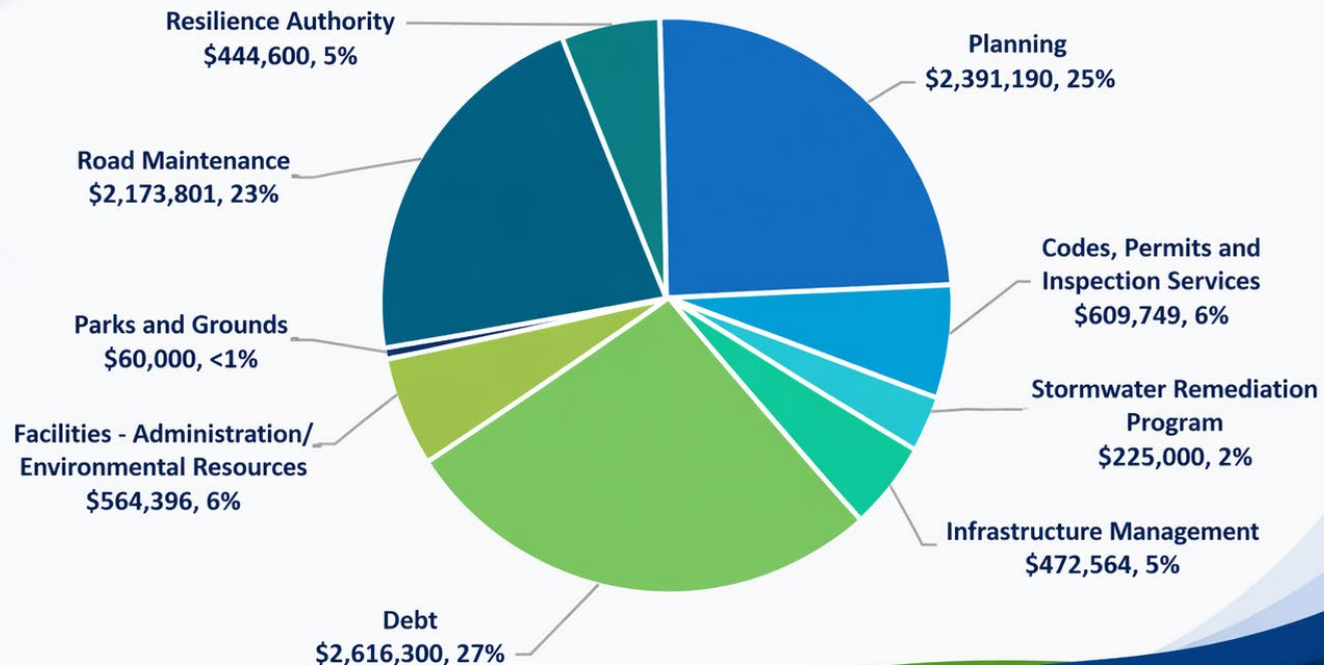
- Recommending a \$13 increase to the current annual fee of \$193 to \$206
  - Proposed Budget includes:
    - New DPW Position: Full-time Recycling Equipment Operator
    - Increased recycling contract costs and curbside collection costs
    - Increased support to the Resilience Authority
    - New and replacement equipment to support operations at various recycling centers and facilities

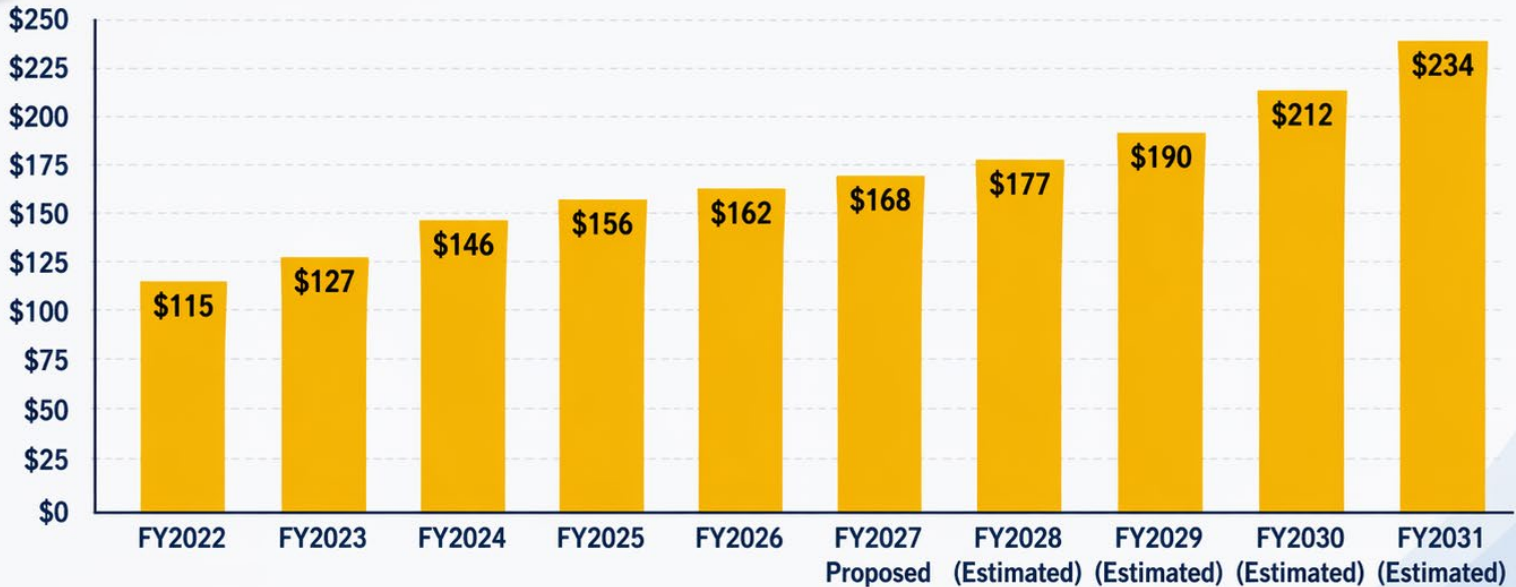
# Watershed Protection and Restoration Fund

- Recommending a \$6 increase to the current annual fee of \$162 to \$168
  - Proposed Budget includes:
    - Additional funding to support maintenance and repair of aging stormwater systems, ponds, and facilities
    - Increase in Resilience Authority support
    - New PGM Position: GIS Supervisor
    - New and replacement equipment to support operations
    - Increased costs for mosquito control, inlet inspections and stormwater maintenance

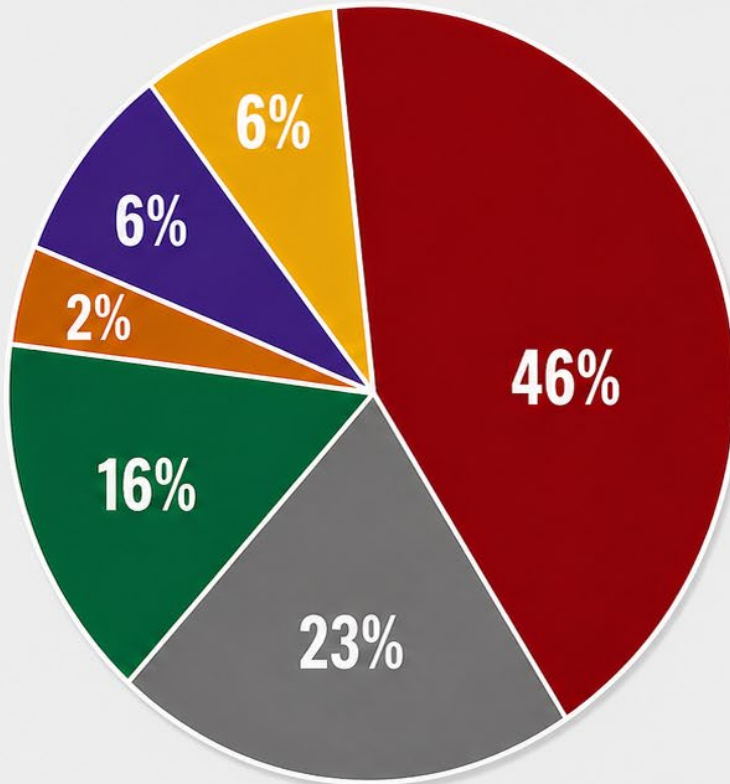

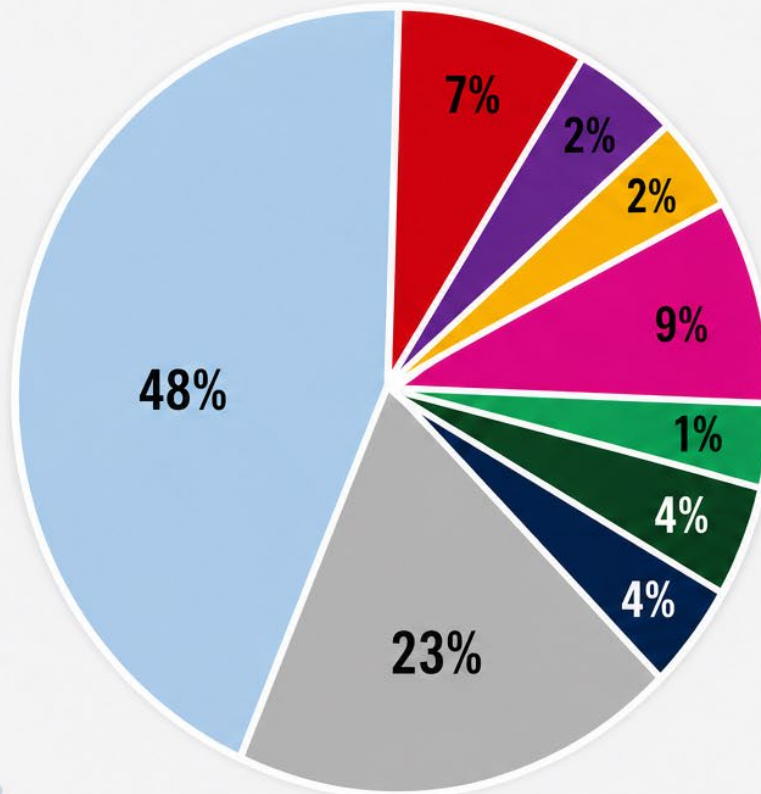
# CIP Revenue Assumptions

- No tax rate increases to property or income tax rates
- Governmental CIP assumes a range of 3-5% operating revenue growth over a five-year period
  - Allows for \$301.4 million in new bond issues over five years
  - \$299.4 million is needed to support the proposed CIP
  - A funding surplus of \$2.0 million remains
- Assumes enterprise fund fees are adjusted yearly to support enterprise fund CIP impact

- Funding for new Middle School #10 (FY2030)
- Portable classrooms to manage shifting attendance and temporary capacity needs
- Kindergarten renovation updates at Dr. Higdon ES and continued funding for Walter J. Mitchell ES
- Future funding for repairs at the CSM La Plata Campus – Bookstore, Campus Center and Fine Arts Center

# CIP Highlights

- Continues funding for Sports & Wellness Center
- Initiates funding for DES West Hawthorne Drive Station
- Supports new La Plata Library and future renovation of the existing library
- Updates funding/timeline for Charles County VanGo Maintenance Facility

- The County has a fees & charges schedule to recover the County's cost to provide a specific service to a customer
- Rates are reviewed annually and adjusted to reflect the cost-of-service delivery
