Animal Control Services

The animal services staff has reported that the preparations thus far for the pets, if needed, are:

1. Contact has been made with the 11 licensed boarding kennels in the County. 10 of these facilities have agreed to accept pets from COVID-19 PUIs or positives. The max capacity of these facilities is around 420 +/- pets. (depends on at what capacity they are at when asked)
2. Contact has been made with the local pet sitting community. These 9+ businesses have affirmed that they will service the COVID-19 PUIs or positives but would require that the pet be brought out to them – no in home pick up or care.
3. The County's animal shelter facility has made the following adjustments to accommodate the community's needs:
 - a. One wing of the facility has been cleared to make room. This includes 14 standard kennels, a free roaming cat room that can be fitted with a large amount of individual crates/cages for cats, a critter room, a restroom and a break room.
 - b. Emergency supplies have been inventoried in the event that an emergency pet shelter needs to be set up – either at the Hughesville facility or in another location.
 - i. 171 portable crates/cages
 - ii. 43 portable critter cages
 - iii. Various feeding, watering and cleaning supplies needed
 - c. Also available for deployment if an offsite location is used would be:
 - i. the 30-foot travel trailer that has been retrofitted as a portable emergency animal shelter (generated), and
 - ii. the 24-foot cargo trailer that is retrofitted as the rescue response trailer. This trailer is designed so that racked supply containers can be switched out and replaced with medium pet crates for additional housing space. This trailer is also generated.

Analysis note: While the U.S. and worldwide numbers continue to rise, so does the availability of testing. It is highly likely the US has tested more citizens than any other country. Sensational “confirmed case numbers” should be placed in context before relying upon them solely to determine the scope and magnitude of the situation.

Weather:

Nice Thursday 60-48, Friday 71-48, Sat 55-51 Rain, Sunday 78-53 sun

Analysis note: Warm weather will likely mean more people outside, increasing the probability of gatherings. Rainy weather will drive people into their residences. The potential for increased calls for police service exists.

Local:

Grocery stores and pharmacies continue to struggle to keep shelves stocked of staples. CVS, Safeway and Target were visited this AM. Shelves are thin. CVS non-RX meds are running low. Target received some cleaning supplies today. Target and Safeway shared the same inventory communications issues that Sam's Club reported. Both reported receiving daily trucks but they have no indication of what is going to be on them. Retailer reported 12 times the normal sales of paper products when the surge hit. Unfortunately, there is no way to speed up production of most paper products. Produce inventories are staying near normal levels at all stores. Meat shipments are steady however, inventory is reduced.

Analyst note: This will likely continue and increase until things stabilize. It will likely take weeks for stabilization to occur and for the supply chain to balance. Law enforcement should be aware of the volatility of people during a crisis. The distribution of facts based messaging and positive stories by the JIC could prove helpful in reducing fear and anxiety. POCs are needed as soon as possible so incident management can remain informed of food and supply shortages.

With the closure of non-essential stores and the governors demand to reduce interaction there is little traffic on the roads.

Commercial burglaries have seen a marked rise.

Charles County closed all building. Employees will be teleworking.

Maryland Update:

MD receive its Federal Major Disaster Declaration

Schools closed at least until 4-24-2020.

All regulated child care centers must close by Friday by close of business. Exception is for authorized facilities caring for essential personnel. The provider must complete an application and submit it to MSDE. Essential personnel will also need to complete a form.

Region:

Over 751 cases in the NCR as of 0500

1645 cases in Maryland, DC, and Virginia as of 1200

Montgomery county is reporting they have 167 ventilators for 1.1 million people

Analysis note: This will likely be a FOIA request soon. It would also seem to critical be critical information the EOC to keep tabs on.

National:

DOD reporting a major increase in positive test for service members. At least one Navy warship is reporting positive cases and has been ordered to port in Guam.

FBI Advisory: Due to school closings as a result of COVID-19, children will potentially have an increased online presence and/or be in a position that puts them at an inadvertent risk. Due to this newly developing environment, the FBI is seeking to warn parents, educators, caregivers, and children about the dangers of online sexual exploitation and signs of child abuse.

Analysis note: CCPS is working on a "Situational Awareness Bulletin."

Local critical infrastructure:

No outages or disruptions are reported or are expected to be likely as of today.

Predications/ Analysis:

- FOIA and PIA request from media and citizens groups will likely begin to increase the longer this event lasts. "New normal" processes need to be established as soon as possible.
- Lack of child care options will likely add to family stress. Additional resources, activity and options are needed.
- JIC staff should substantially amplify community resource communications
- As we enter the 2nd week of social distancing stress, anxiety, and fear will likely increase. Continuous reminders of patience and focusing on kindness will become increasingly important.
- Many stores restock overnight. Seniors and the vulnerable populations should be strongly encouraged to shop during the early morning hours when supplies are likely to be at their highest.
- As testing increased the confirmed cases in MD will increase. This will likely cause additional life restrictions.
- Supply chain issues will continue and likely increase as further life interruptions and travel restrictions are ordered. The possibility of violence increases as stress increases, especially at grocery stores.
- Commanders of responders and essential staff should have robust plans for potential quarantines and updated continuity of operations including plans for diminished manpower. Further, responder organizations should begin reviewing existing integration plans with the National Guard.
- Obtaining medical supplies and PPE will continue to be an issue for the foreseeable future. All services should use the command ordering process so orders can be tracked.
- The community of Charles County is showing increased signs of pulling together and assisting one another. The JIC should continue to encourage civility and increase positive press of good news stories occurring throughout our community.

48-hour Priorities:

- Establishing instructional continuity
- Expanding and maintaining food service
- Situational bulletin re: online learning

Meals:

On 3-26 CCPS served 6078 meals an **increase of 554 meals over 3-25**. Westlake High School and St Charles continues to be the busiest sites, for example on 3-25 they served over 1,000 meals at each of those sites.

NO MEAL DISTRIBUTION SAT and SUN

Closure:

School closure through at least 4-24-20.

MSDE closed all regulated child care centers as of today at 1700.

Instruction:

Distribution of computers for teachers and students in need of technology are being looked into as a way to help support our distant learning.

Plan as of 3-26-2020. Excerpt from a memo sent to all CCPS Staff:

Monday, March 30

Teachers should finish and post grades for the third quarter.

Directions will be sent out how to finish grading since the quarter ended early.

Elementary teachers preview materials on SharePoint.

Secondary teachers watch the APEX training video and prepare to set up rosters.

Special education teachers review all student IEPs on their caseload and watch the Goalbook training videos. Additional webinars will be planned later in the week.

Tuesday, March 31

Wednesday, April 1

Continue to prepare for instruction and complete roster assignments.

Thursday, April 2

Send your first communication to students via Synergy Mail. Your communication should reestablish your relationship with your students and explain what the instruction will look like in the future.

Secondary teachers will ensure that all students know how to log into their APEX account.

Friday, April 3

Instruction begins and all teachers are available during "office hours" to communicate with students and to answer questions. Office hours will be established by level.

Elementary staff must be available from 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m., middle school staff from 11:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m. and high school from 1:00-4:00 p.m.

COMAR defines an academic day as three hours; hence, the designated office hours.

Community Wifi:

4 sites are up and broadcasting. Picco, Mt Hope, Henson, and TC Martin. Press release was delayed should go out 3-27-2020. We continue to work with AT&T FirstNet to increase signal strength.

Comcast and Verizon are taking different approach to assist the Covid-19 demands. Both of them are sending self-installation kits (routers and starter packets) free to non-customers and offering the basic internet plan for free (2 months). Comcast opened up all public Wi-Fi (hotspots) to everyone for the next 60 days. On top of this all mobile carriers (Verizon, AT&T, T Mobile, Sprint) have decided to give unlimited bandwidth to all subscribers and there won't be any data over charges.
