




Community Services:	<p>DCS Housing Authority staff are actively processing expedited changes in monthly Housing Assistance Payments (HAP) for current housing choice voucher clients who have experienced a loss of income. Tenants on the HCV program simply need to contact the Division to notify their designated worker of a documented change/loss of household income and the Specialist will work with them to adjust their HAP payment amount. This change will allow HCV tenants to continue making adjusted rental payments each month to avoid falling behind if they have experienced new unemployment or other reduced income due to COVID-19. Tenants can call 301-934-0130 and leave a voicemail indicating their name, the name of their designated housing worker, and that they need a HAP payment adjustment. They will receive a return call with instructions on next steps to expedite their request.</p> <p>For persons who may be in dangerous or abusive relationships, concerns are rising about co-quarantining in an unsafe home environment, especially as anxiety and tensions increase</p>

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	<p>surrounding the public health crisis. <p>Lifestyles:</p>	<p>Coordination</p> <p><i>We are continuing to look at most appropriate locations for sanitation centers. In the meantime, staff are purchasing and distributing solar showers. Through an arrangement with a local laundry mat, laundry vouchers were created to give individuals to allow them to wash their clothes. The time is scheduled to allow for social distancing as well as disinfecting the area.</i></p> <p>Food services</p> <p><i>The response and requests for food in certain areas are overwhelming. Three cabanas operated today as well as curbside distributions. We continue to seek supplies for these distributions.</i></p> <p>Meal deliveries: <i>We are continuing meal/grocery deliveries to homebound residents. These meal deliveries are scheduled for weekday deliveries, utilizing homebound delivery protocols developed by the Maryland Food Bank. When the purchase of groceries is more efficient and economic it will be used as an alternative. Households must be pre-approved and requests for same-day delivery may be considered but not a guarantee of availability.</i></p> <p>Outreach</p> <p><i>Street outreach was conducted in La Plata and two Waldorf sites yesterday. 25 to 27 people were seen and provided items. Staff noted several new persons not previously known to LifeStyles. Individuals living in encampments are in dire need of face coverings, water and hand sanitizer. There were no children noted during today's outreach. We have purchased sanitizer from Blue Dyer Distillery. We purchased 10 gallons and they will donate 2 gallons.</i></p> <p>Facilities</p> <p><i>All participants and staff are doing temperature checks daily. Limited access to all facilities. Guests are not allowed at facilities at this time.</i></p>

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	<p>CRMC has dedicating one unit specifically to be for COVID-19 positive patients or for PUI's that have been admitted to the hospital. The dedicated COVID-19 unit is on 3 South until further notice. That 3 South COVID-19 unit has been fully activated as of 4/3/2020. There are currently 10 patients in the ICU as of 4/9/2020.</p> <p>Number of ventilators owned by CRMC = 17. As of 4/9/2020 there are 5 patients on ventilators. Four (4) of the ventilated patients are positive for COVID-19.</p> <p>An EMS Ambulance decontamination area has been established in a parking lot near the ambulance area (but not obstructing to it).</p> <p>CRMC has implemented a policy that requires ALL staff, visitors (which would be very limited), and contractors of any kind to wear a mask while in the hospital at all times.</p>

INTERPRETIVE GUIDANCE

Number: COVID19-09

Date: April 1, 2020

Re: Order of the Governor of the State of Maryland, Number 20-03-30-01, dated March 30, 2020, Amending and Restating the Order of March 23, 2020, Prohibiting Large Gatherings and Events and Closing Senior Centers, and All Non-Essential Businesses and Other Establishments, Additionally Requiring All Persons to Stay at Home

At this time, the Office of Legal Counsel (“OLC”) recommends that the Administration interpret the above-referenced Order as follows:

1. **Drive-In Religious Services.** Churches, synagogues, mosques, temples, and other similar religious facilities of any faith (“Religious Facilities”) may conduct “drive-in” services, where participants gather in their vehicles near the Religious Facility and participate in the service together by remote means, subject to the following requirements, which are intended to protect public health, safety, and welfare:
 - a. Participants may leave their Homes to travel by vehicle to and from the Religious Facility, and must remain in their vehicle at all times.
 - b. No vehicle may contain more than 10 persons, in accordance with paragraph III of the Order.
 - c. Participants may not interact physically with clergy, staff, or participants in other vehicles. This includes, but is not limited to, collecting donations by basket or plate.
2. **Limited In-Person Services.** Clergy may conduct limited in-person services at their respective Religious Facilities, and participants may leave their Homes to travel to and from the Religious Facility for such services, subject to the following requirements, which are intended to protect public health, safety, and welfare:
 - a. No more than 10 persons, including clergy, staff and participants, may be present inside the Religious Facility during the service.
 - b. Participants may not interact physically with clergy, staff, or participants. This includes, but is not limited to, collecting donations by basket or plate.
 - c. Participants, clergy, and staff must (i) be at least six feet apart from one another at all times, except for participants that are part of the same household; and (ii) comply with all applicable guidance from the CDC and MDH regarding social distancing.
 - d. There must be at least a four hour gap between the end of one in-person service and the beginning of the next in-person service. The Religious Facility should be cleaned between services, in accordance with CDC cleaning and disinfection guidance.
3. **Minimal Operations at Religious Facilities.** Clergy and other staff of Religious Facilities are permitted to continue conducting Minimal Operations under paragraph IV.c of the Order, provided that they comply with all applicable guidance from the CDC and MDH regarding social distancing. In the case of religious facilities, the term “Minimal Operations” includes, but is not necessarily limited to, facilitating remote services.
4. **Effect on Prior Interpretive Guidance.** Paragraph 6 of Interpretive Guidance COVID19-08 is rescinded and superseded by this document.

This Interpretive Guidance maybe revised or rescinded at any time. Citizens are urged to consult with their own legal counsel for advice about the application of the Order and this Interpretive Guidance to their particular facts and circumstances.
