2. PPE stockpiles remain stable with an estimated supply range of 10+ days based on current call volumes.		
3. Revision to EMSOP Special Order 2020-01 Version 3.1 has been completed and disseminated to staff.		
4. As this is a rapidly changing landscape, leaders should review any changes with their personnel each morning.		
5. With the implementation of the most recent update of special Order 2020-01 V 3.1, personnel should continue to perform wellness checks twice a day as prescribed in the SO as well as decon apparatus frequently.		
6. Personnel who report having a fever, sore throat, cough or other respiratory related symptoms should stay at home and self-isolate until they are symptom free for a period of 72 hours.		
7. The County's Peer Support Team has been activated and will make weekly wellness checks with our County's first responders. We are working through the logisitcs but will provide an email address and phone number to contact the team. Will diseminate when we have the contact information.		
8. Please remember that PPE caches are for EVERYONE. We are all in this TOGETHER so there is NO career and volunteer PPE caches.		
9. Under the approval of the EOC and to keep congruent with the CDC and Governor Hogan's recommendations, Safety has approved the use of simple face masks (commercial or crafted) in the public arena. Per SOP, N95's are to be used for all patient contacts with reuse guidelines in place per the CDC recomendations.		
10. Law enforcement officers should wear eye protection. Gloves and masks when administering narkan to opiod patients. There is a high risk of mucous aerosolization during this procedure. Play it safe!

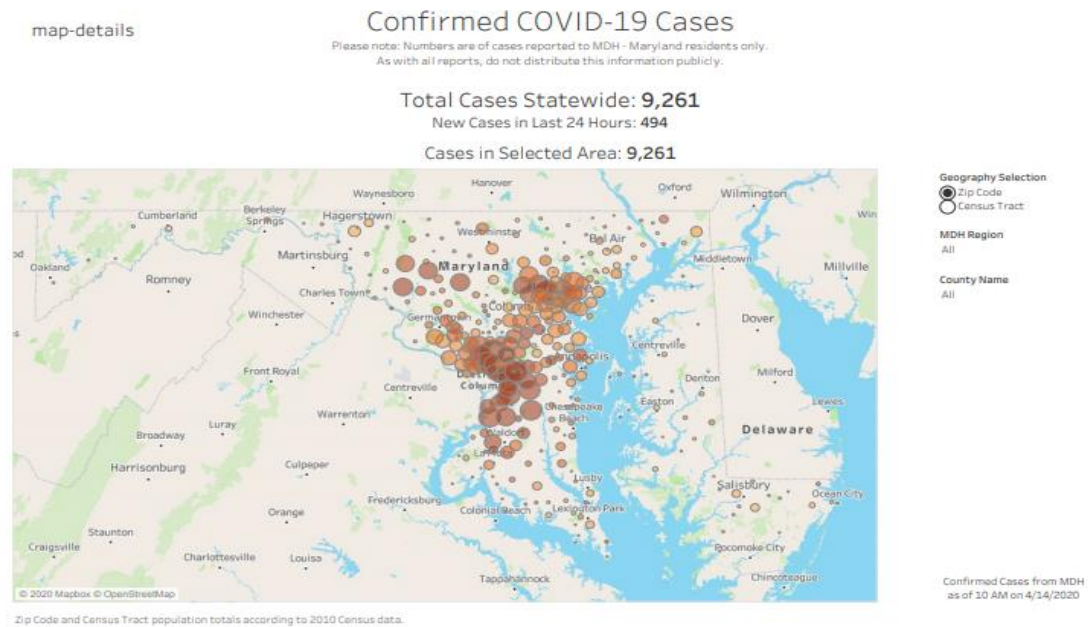

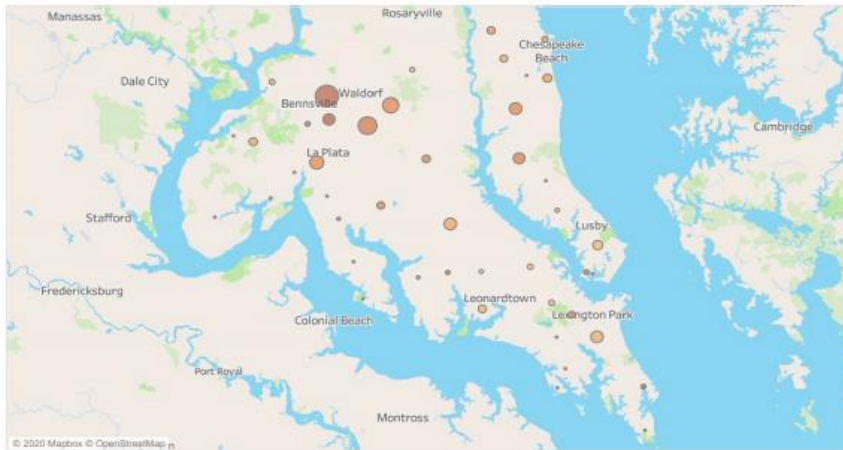

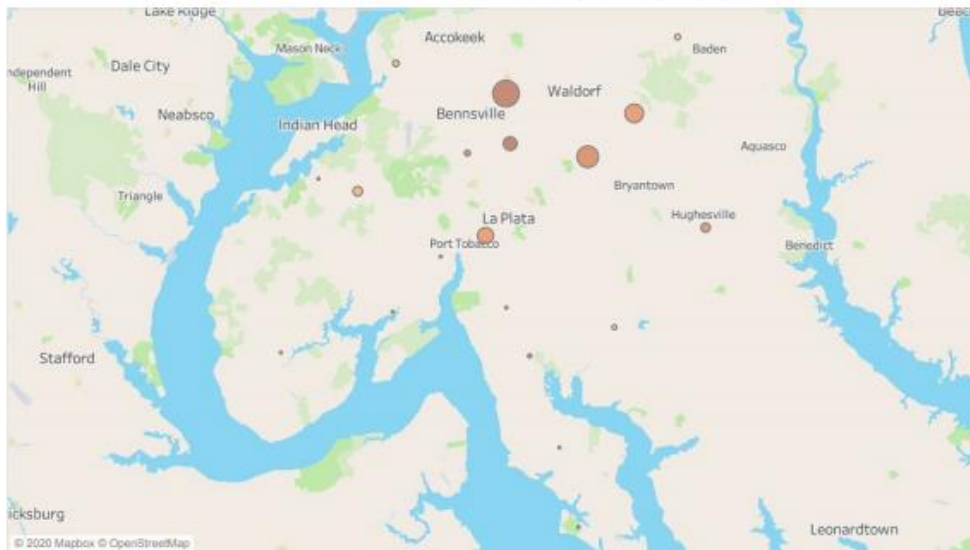

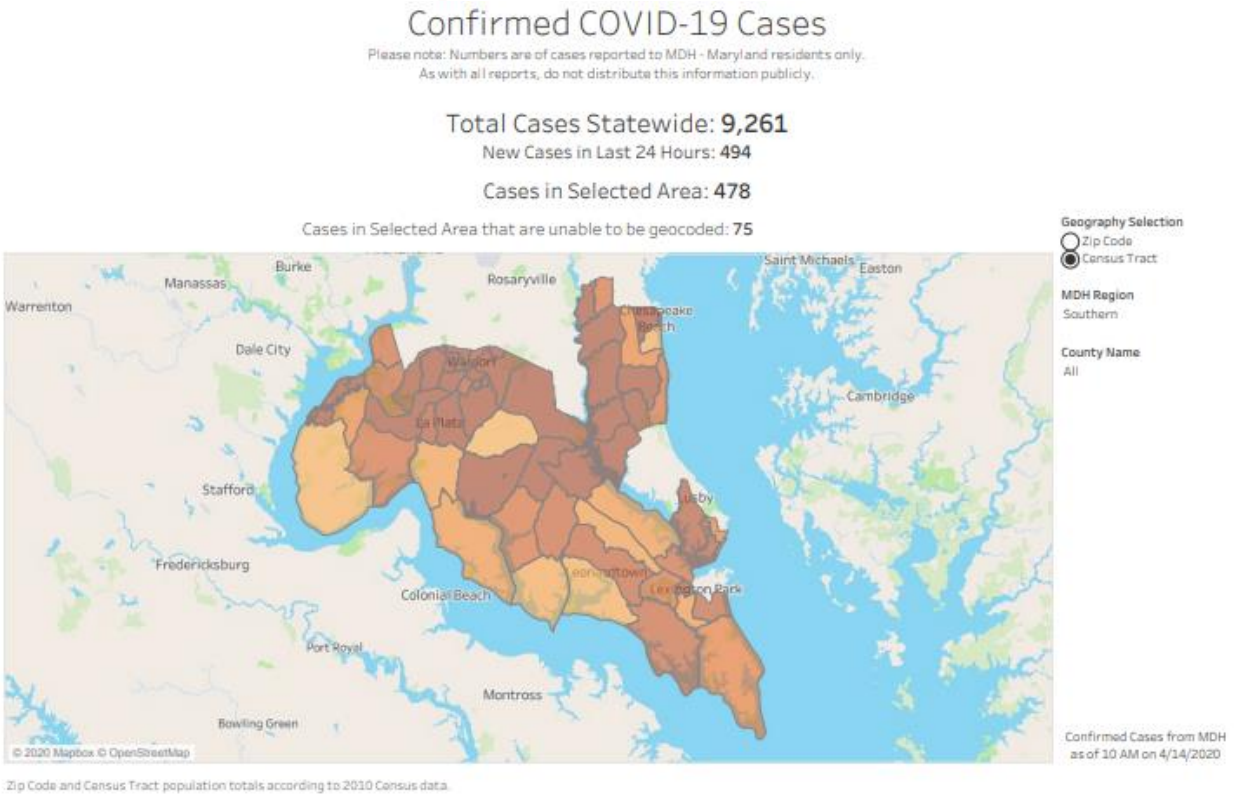

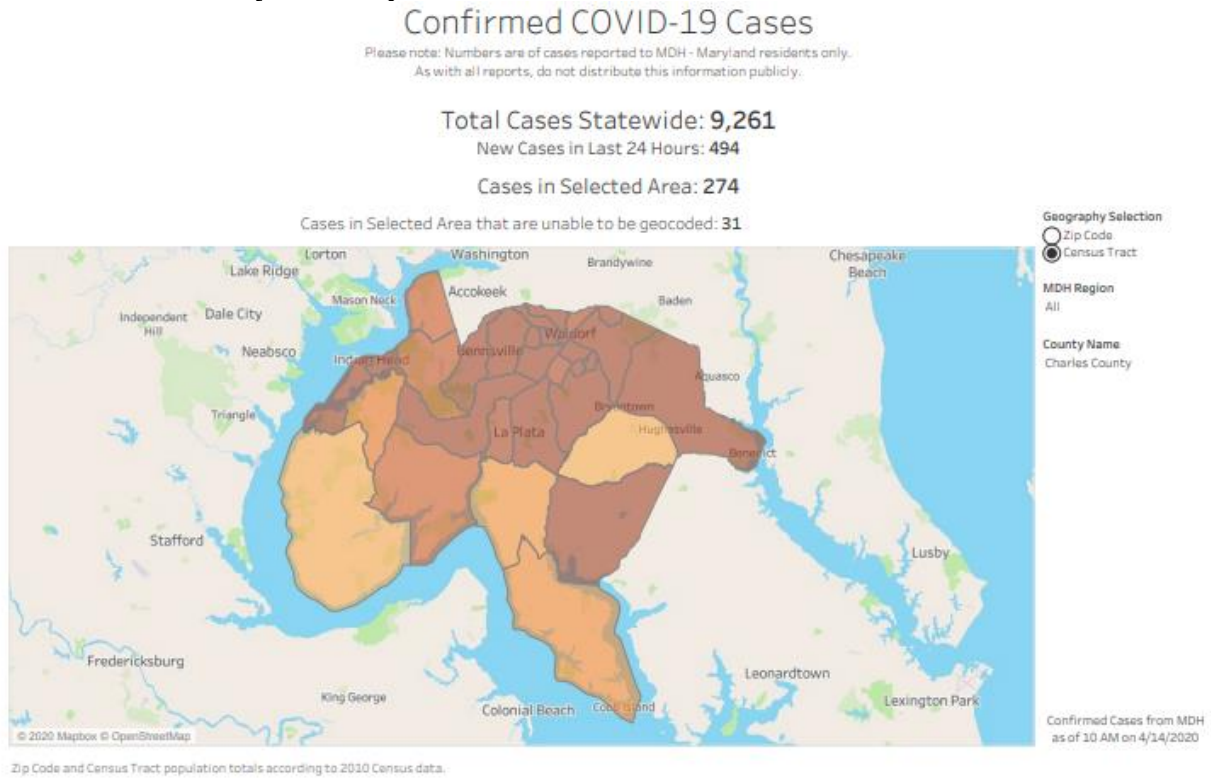

- Gender, Age, Region (Fatalities)

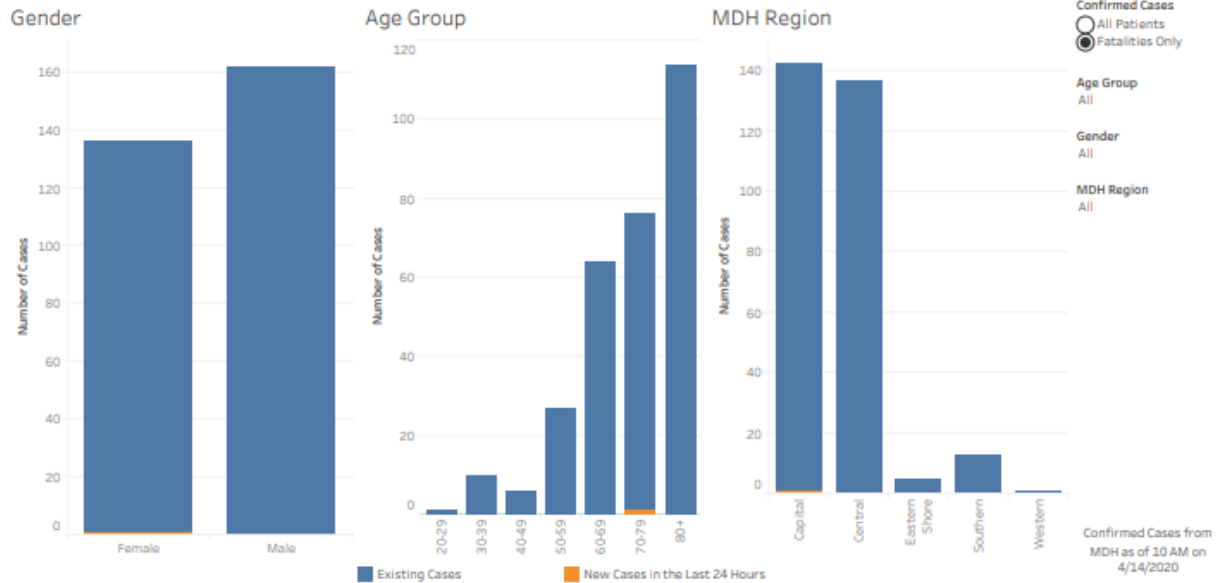

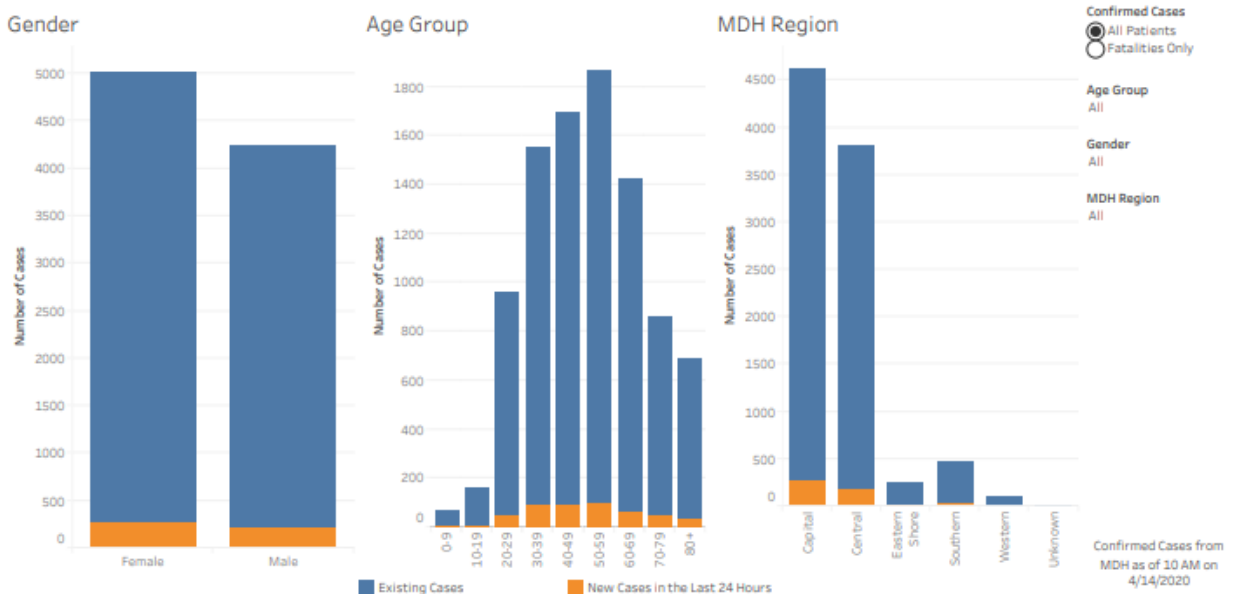

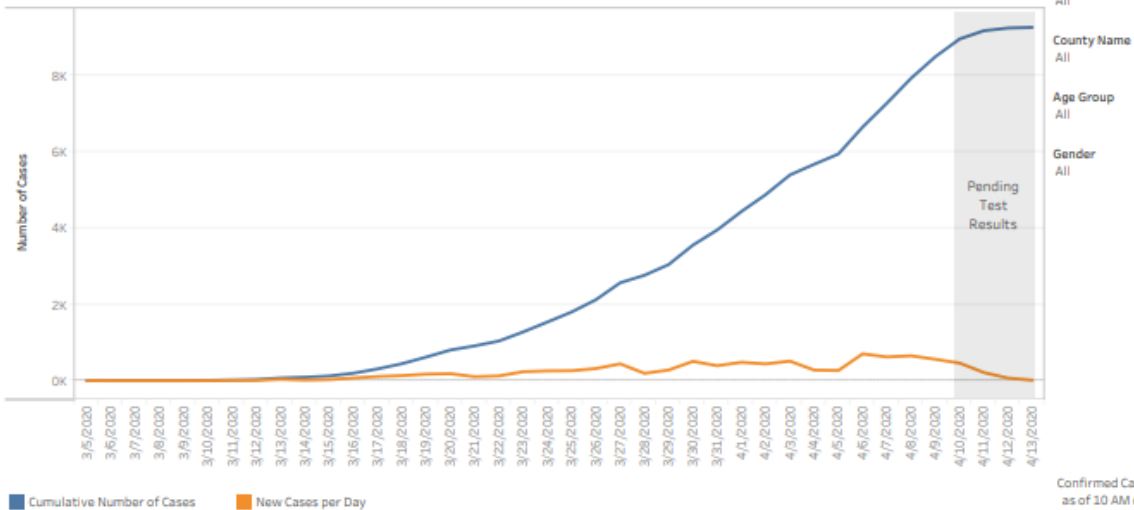

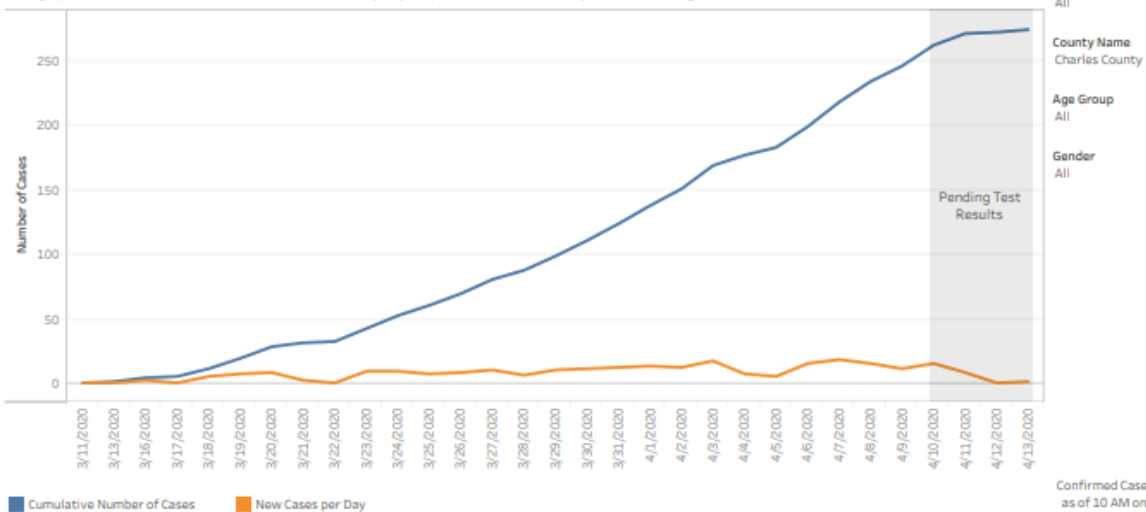

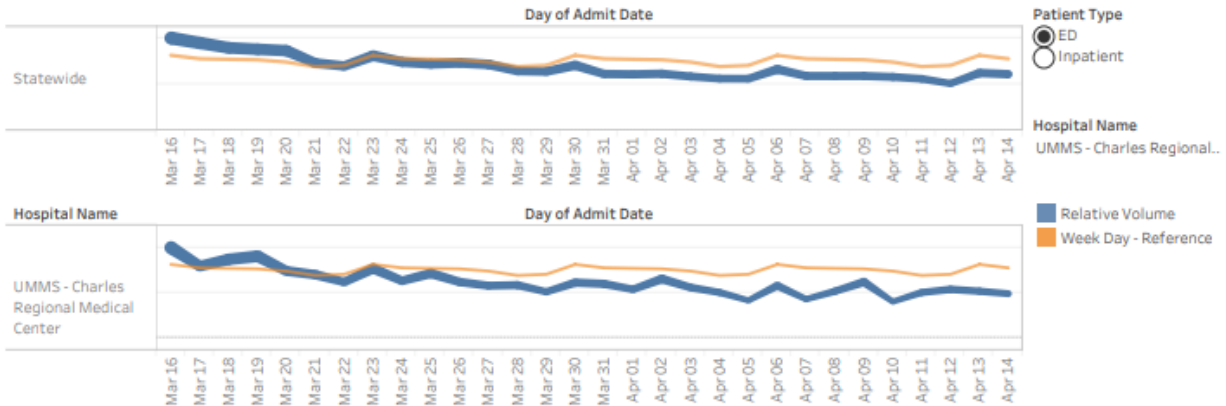

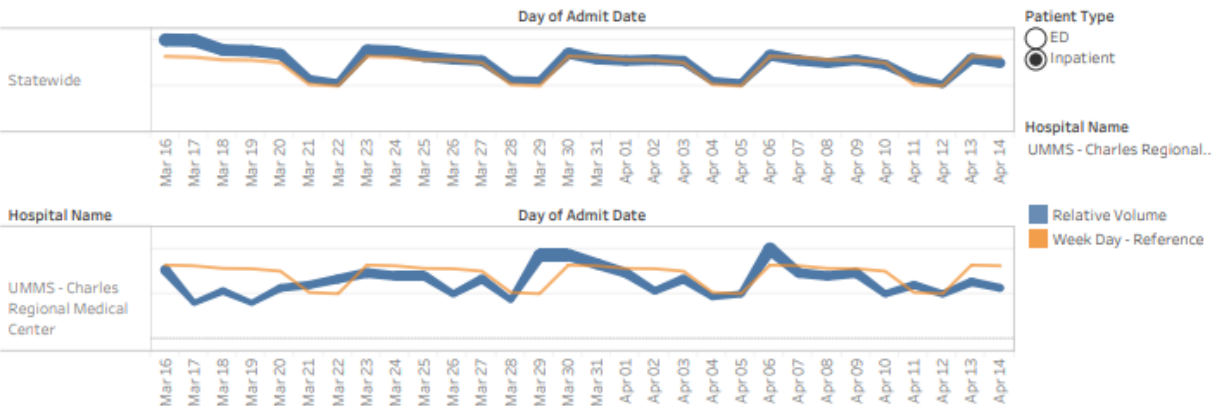


- Hospital Volume Trends Inpatient**

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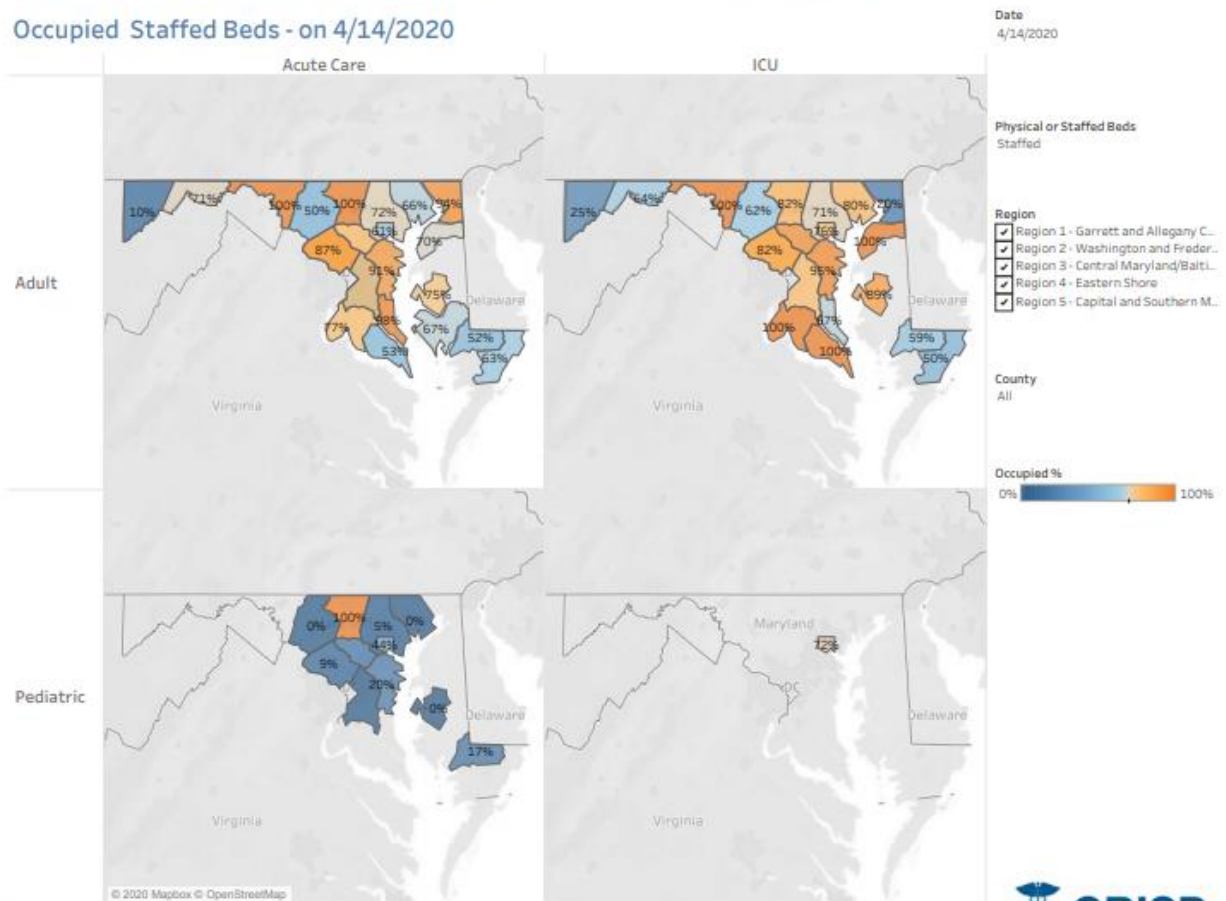

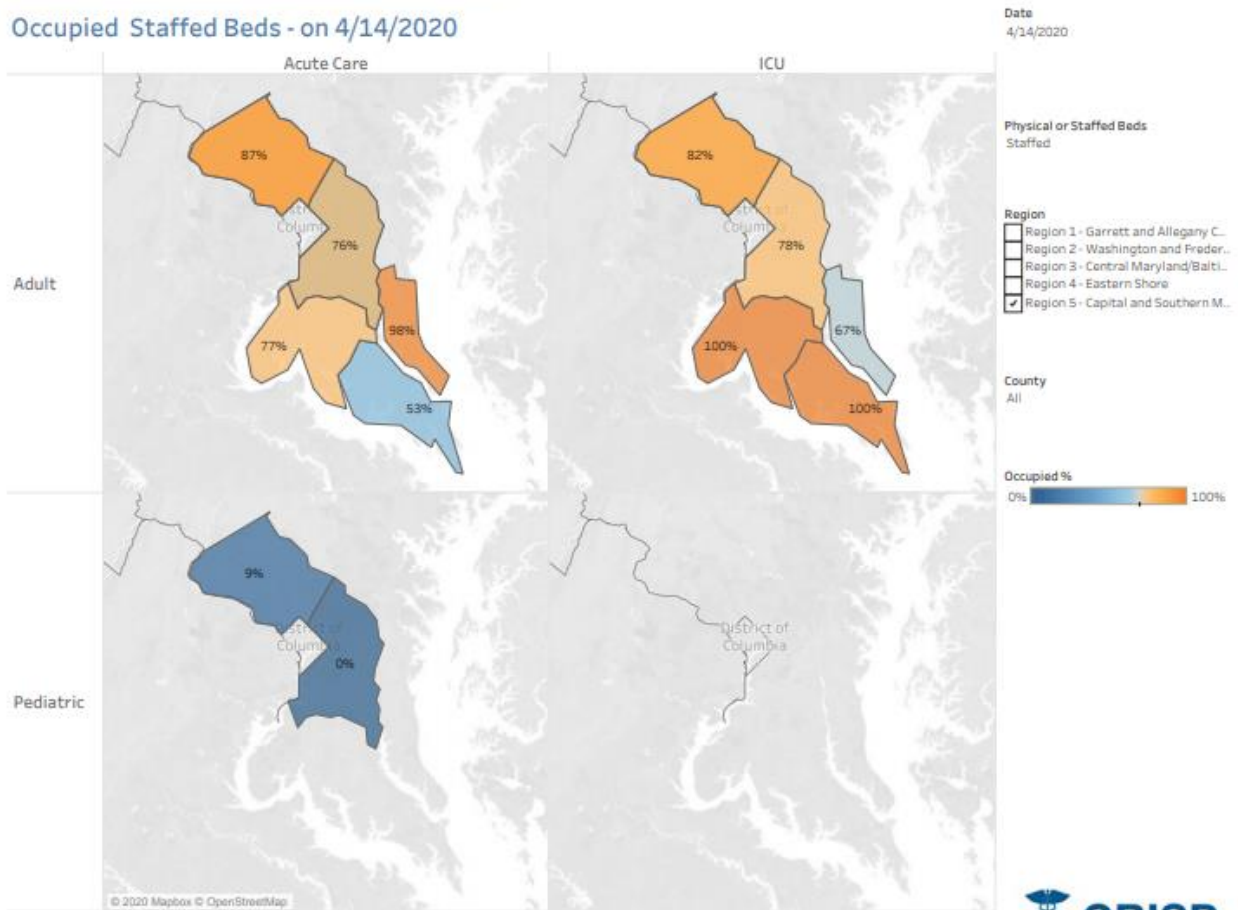

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Occupied Staffed Beds - on 4/14/2020



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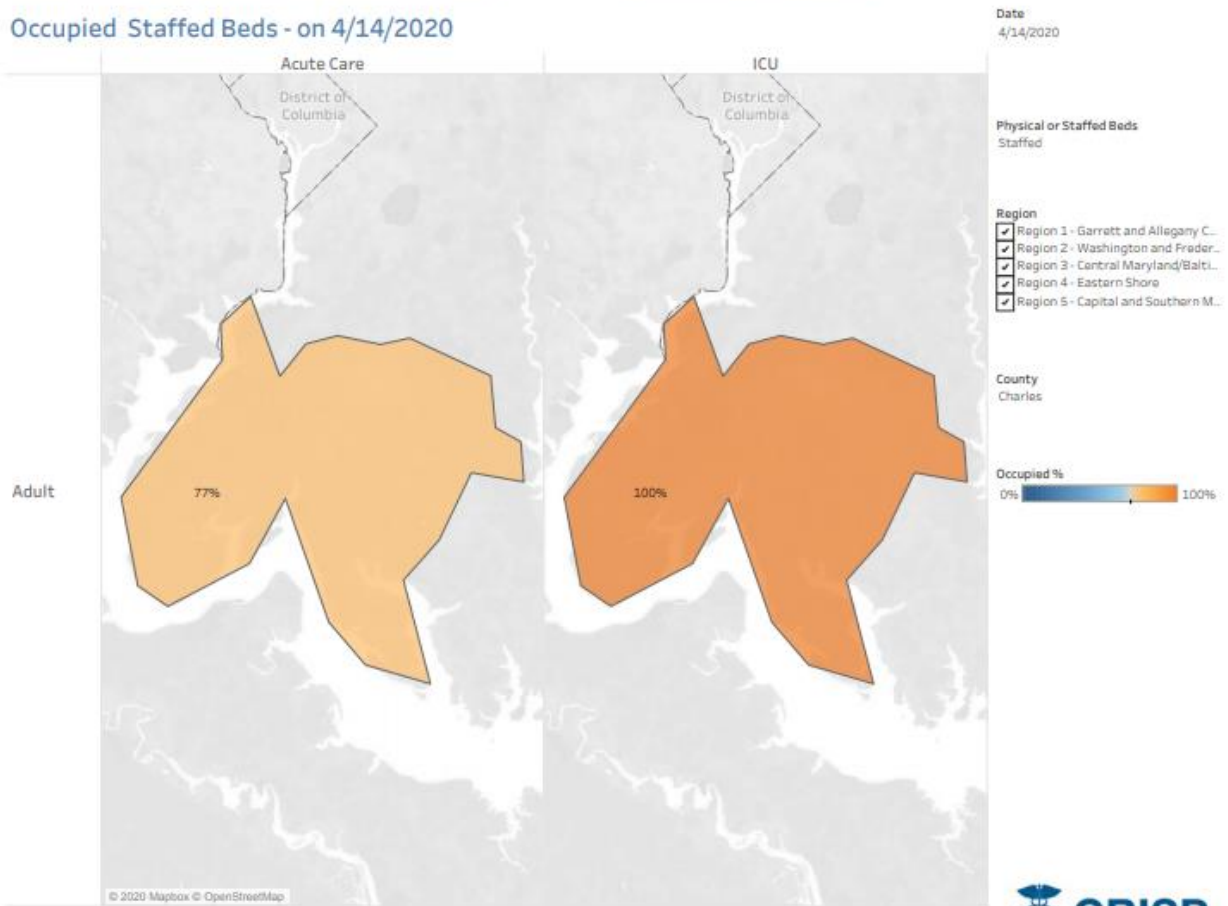

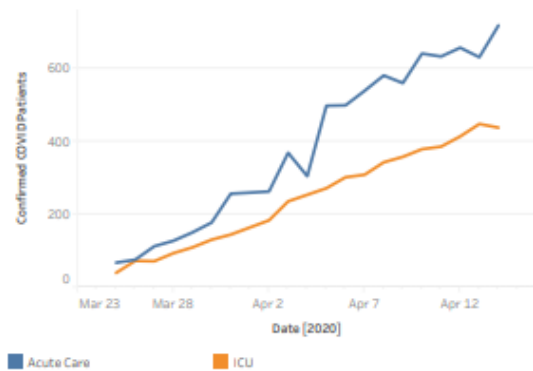

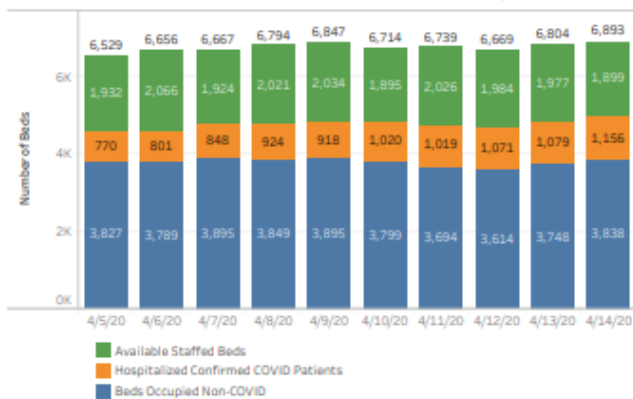
Number of COVID-19 Positive Patients in Acute Care and ICU

REQUIRING USE OF FACE COVERINGS UNDER CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES AND REQUIRING IMPLEMENTATION OF CERTAIN PHYSICAL DISTANCING MEASURES

- WHEREAS, A state of emergency and catastrophic health emergency was proclaimed on March 5, 2020, renewed on March 17, 2020, and renewed again on April 10, 2020, to control and prevent the spread of COVID-19 within the state, and the state of emergency and catastrophic health emergency still exists;
- WHEREAS, COVID-19, a respiratory disease that spreads easily from person to person and may result in serious illness or death, is a public health catastrophe and has been confirmed throughout Maryland;
- WHEREAS, To reduce the spread of COVID-19, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Maryland Department of Health recommend canceling large gatherings and physical distancing in smaller gatherings;
- WHEREAS, The currently known and available scientific evidence and best practices support limitations on large gatherings and physical distancing to prevent exposures and transmissions, and reduce the threat to especially vulnerable populations, including older individuals and those with chronic health conditions;
- WHEREAS, To reduce the threat to human health caused by transmission of the novel coronavirus in Maryland, and to protect and save lives, it is necessary and reasonable that individuals in the state refrain from congregating;
- WHEREAS, To protect the public health, welfare, and safety, prevent the transmission of the novel coronavirus, control the spread of COVID-19, and save lives, it is necessary to control and direct the movement of individuals in Maryland, including those on the public streets; and
- WHEREAS, It is further necessary to control and direct in Maryland the occupancy and use of buildings and premises, as well as places of amusement and assembly;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LAWRENCE J. HOGAN, JR., GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND, BY VIRTUE OF THE AUTHORITY VESTED IN ME BY THE CONSTITUTION AND LAWS OF MARYLAND, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO TITLE 14 OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY ARTICLE, AND IN AN EFFORT TO CONTROL AND PREVENT THE SPREAD OF COVID-19 WITHIN THE STATE, DO HEREBY ORDER:

I. Definitions.

- a. "Face Covering" means a covering that fully covers a person's nose and mouth, but is not a Medical-Grade Mask. The term "Face Covering" includes, without limitation, scarves and bandanas.
- b. "Foodservice Establishments" means establishments in the State of Maryland that sell food on a delivery, carry-out, or drive-through basis.
- c. "Medical-Grade Mask" means an N95, KN95, surgical, or other mask that would be appropriate for a health care setting.
- d. "Public Transportation" means shared-ride surface transportation services that are open to the general public, including without limitation, taxi services, ride-sharing services, car services, and transit services provided by any other unit of the State or any political subdivision. Examples of Public Transportation include, but are not limited to:
 - i. MTA bus service;
 - ii. MARC train service;
 - iii. Light Rail trains service;
 - iv. MTA Metro subway service; and
 - v. Mobility and paratransit service.
- e. "Retail Establishments" means retail businesses, organizations, establishments, and facilities in the State of Maryland, including without limitation:
 - i. Grocery stores, convenience stores, farmer's markets, and any other establishment engaged in the retail sale of non-prepared food;
 - ii. Pharmacies and other stores that sell medication or medical supplies;
 - iii. Stores that sell supplies for household consumption or use, and/or products needed to maintain safety, sanitation, and essential maintenance of the home or residence;
 - iv. Alcoholic beverage stores; and

- v. Laundromats.

II. Use of Face Coverings.

- a. Effective as of 7:00 a.m. on April 18, 2020:
 - i. all riders and operators on any Public Transportation are required to wear Face Coverings (excluding any operator in a separate compartment that is off-limits to riders);
 - ii. all customers over the age of nine are required to wear Face Coverings while inside the enclosed area of any Retail Establishment or Foodservice Establishment;
 - iii. adult customers accompanying children age two through nine shall use reasonable efforts to cause those children to wear Face Coverings while inside the enclosed area of any Retail Establishment or Foodservice Establishment;
 - iv. all Retail Establishments shall require staff to wear, and those staff shall wear, Face Coverings while working in areas open to the general public and areas in which interactions with other staff are likely; and
 - v. all Foodservice Establishments shall require staff who interact with customers (including, without limitation, delivery personnel) to wear, and those staff shall wear, Face Coverings while working.
- b. Single-use Face Coverings shall be properly discarded in trash receptacles. It is recommended that all reusable Face Coverings be cleaned frequently (at least once per day).
- c. Wearing a Medical-Grade Mask satisfies any requirement in paragraph II.a to wear a Face Covering, but all Marylanders are urged to reserve Medical-Grade Masks for use by health care workers and first responders.

III. Physical Distancing Measures for Retail Establishments.


- a. All Retail Establishments shall, in good faith and to the extent possible:
 - i. Where any queue is expected to form, designated with signage, tape, or by other means at least six-foot spacing for persons in line;
 - ii. Sanitize, or provide customers with a means to sanitize, handles of carts and baskets that are available to customers;
 - iii. Provide staff and customers with clean restrooms stocked with soap or sanitizer, and allow staff to wash their hands at least once every 30 minutes; and

- iv. Post signage at each entrance advising customers about the requirement to wear Face Coverings described in paragraph II.a.
- b. The Secretary of Health of the State of Maryland (the "Secretary") is authorized to issue directives under this Order, as the Secretary deems necessary, to prevent, reduce the spread of, and suppress COVID-19 in and around Retail Establishments and/or Foodservice Establishments, which may include, without limitation, additional requirements for physical distancing, cleaning, and disinfection at Retail Establishments and/or Foodservice Establishments.

IV. General Provisions.

- a. Each law enforcement officer of the State or a political subdivision shall execute and enforce this Order.
- b. A person who knowingly and willfully violates this Order is guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction is subject to imprisonment not exceeding one year or a fine not exceeding \$5,000 or both.
- c. This Order remains effective until after termination of the state of emergency and the proclamation of the catastrophic health emergency has been rescinded, or until rescinded, superseded, amended, or revised by additional orders.
- d. The effect of any statute, rule, or regulation of an agency of the State or a political subdivision inconsistent with this order is hereby suspended.
- e. The underlined paragraph headings in this Order are for convenience of reference only and shall not affect the interpretation of this Order.
- f. If any provision of this Order or its application to any person, entity, or circumstance is held invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, all other provisions or applications of the Order shall remain in effect to the extent possible without the invalid provision or application. To achieve this purpose, the provisions of this Order are severable.

FACILITATING MEETINGS OF STOCKHOLDERS OF MARYLAND CORPORATIONS
AND MEETINGS OF SHAREHOLDERS OF MARYLAND REAL ESTATE INVESTMENT

- WHEREAS, A state of emergency and catastrophic health emergency was proclaimed on March 5, 2020, renewed on March 17, 2020, and renewed again on April 10, 2020, to control and prevent the spread of COVID-19 within the state, and the state of emergency and catastrophic health emergency still exists;
- WHEREAS, COVID-19, a respiratory disease that spreads easily from person to person and may result in serious illness or death, is a public health catastrophe and has been confirmed throughout Maryland and in many other places around the world;
- WHEREAS, To reduce the spread of and exposures to COVID-19, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Maryland Department of Health, consistent with the currently known and available scientific evidence and best practices, recommend social distancing;
- WHEREAS, It is necessary and reasonable to prevent the transmission of the novel coronavirus in the state, and save lives, for individuals to refrain from congregating;
- WHEREAS, Maryland corporations and/or Maryland real estate investment trusts may have provided notice of annual or special meetings of stockholders or shareholders to be held at a physical location prior to the time when the public health threat of COVID-19 became fully apparent; and
- WHEREAS, To avoid having individuals congregating at meetings of stockholders of Maryland corporations and shareholders of Maryland real estate investment trusts, it is necessary and reasonable to allow such meetings to occur using remote communications;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LAWRENCE J. HOGAN, JR., GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND, BY VIRTUE OF THE AUTHORITY VESTED IN ME BY THE CONSTITUTION

AND LAWS OF MARYLAND, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO TITLE 14 OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY ARTICLE, AND IN AN EFFORT TO CONTROL AND PREVENT THE SPREAD OF COVID-19 WITHIN THE STATE, DO HEREBY ORDER:

I. Definitions. As used herein:

- a. "Publicly-traded Maryland company" means a corporation incorporated under the Maryland General Corporation Law or a real estate investment trust formed under Title 8 of the Corporations and Associations Article of the Maryland Code, in each case that is subject to the reporting requirements of Section 13(a) or Section 15(d) of the federal Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended.
- b. "Shareholders" means the stockholders or shareholders of a publicly-traded Maryland company.
- c. "Shareholders' meeting" means an annual or special meeting of shareholders of a publicly-traded Maryland company.

II. Remote Meetings.

- a. Notwithstanding any provision of its charter, declaration of trust, or bylaws, a publicly-traded Maryland company may do the following, subject to the conditions in paragraph II.b below:
 - i. change a shareholders' meeting currently noticed for a physical location to be a meeting conducted solely or in part by remote communication; and/or
 - ii. postpone or adjourn a shareholders' meeting currently noticed for a physical location to another date or time, whether to be held in person or solely or in part by remote communication,
- b. A publicly-traded Maryland company may change, postpone, or adjourn a shareholders' meeting pursuant to paragraph II.a above if:
 - i. the board of directors or trustees of the publicly-traded Maryland company determines that, as a result of the public health threat caused by COVID-19 in the United States, it is reasonable, prudent and advisable to do so; and
 - ii. the publicly-traded Maryland company notifies its shareholders of the change, postponement, or adjournment by (a) publicly filing a document with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission; and (b) a press release, which shall be promptly posted on the publicly-traded Maryland company's website after release.



PRESERVING THE SUPPLY OF NECESSARY DRUGS

- WHEREAS, A state of emergency and catastrophic health emergency was proclaimed on March 5, 2020, renewed on March 17, 2020, and renewed again on April 10, 2020, to control and prevent the spread of COVID-19 within Maryland, and the state of emergency and catastrophic health emergency continues to exist;
- WHEREAS, Interest has increased in possibly preventing or treating COVID-19 with drugs commonly prescribed to treat malaria, lupus, rheumatoid arthritis, HIV, bacterial infections, and other medical conditions;
- WHEREAS, The surge in demand for these drugs in Maryland has led to the increased prescribing and dispensing of them;
- WHEREAS, Increased prescribing and dispensing of these drugs has resulted in an inadequate supply for their intended use as potentially life-sustaining treatment for chronic and acute conditions, as well as for hospitalized patients with COVID-19 within facility-specific protocols while research studies are ongoing;
- WHEREAS, In response to the medical consequences of the catastrophic health emergency, supplies of certain drugs and medications may be procured, seized, or otherwise taken for emergency use;
- WHEREAS, Assuring an adequate supply of these drugs requires current control, restriction, and regulation of their use, sale, and dispensing, including through rationing, quotas, and stockpiles;
- WHEREAS, Health care providers have a duty pursuant to federal and State law to prescribe and dispense medications solely for a legitimate medical purpose and consistent with the evidence for its use; and
- WHEREAS, It is necessary during the state of emergency and catastrophic health emergency that the supply of these drugs is maintained;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LAWRENCE J. HOGAN, JR., GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND, BY VIRTUE OF THE AUTHORITY VESTED IN ME BY THE CONSTITUTION AND LAWS OF MARYLAND, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO TITLE 14 OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY ARTICLE, AND IN AN EFFORT TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC HEALTH, WELFARE, AND SAFETY, DO HEREBY ORDER:

1. Definitions.


- a. "COVID-19" means an infection of the virus known as SARS-CoV-2 or the 2019 novel coronavirus.
- b. "Dispenser" means a pharmacy, pharmacist, or other person authorized by law to dispense a prescription drug in Maryland.
- c. "Restricted Drug" means a medication, including chloroquine, hydroxychloroquine, and azithromycin, that:
 - i. is approved for medical use in treatment of certain immunological, inflammatory, or infectious diseases; and
 - ii. the Secretary of Health has determined:
 - 1. is being prescribed to treat the symptoms of or as a prophylaxis for COVID19; and
 - 2. for which preservation is necessary to ensure an adequate supply for approved medical uses.

2. A dispenser shall fill or refill a prescription for a Restricted Drug only if:

- a. the prescription:
 - i. is not intended for a patient as:
 - 1. treatment for the symptoms of undiagnosed COVID-19; or
 - 2. as a prophylaxis for undiagnosed COVID19;
 - ii. includes written documentation of a diagnosis that the dispenser determines, based on generally accepted professional standards, and after consultation with the health care practitioner if necessary:
 - 1. indicates a legitimate medical purpose for the prescription; and

2. is consistent with the evidence for the Restricted Drug's use; and
 - iii. is issued by a health care practitioner:
 1. authorized to prescribe in Maryland; and
 2. has a bona fide practitioner-patient relationship with the patient; or
 - b. the Restricted Drug had been dispensed to the patient on or before March 5, 2020, for an approved medical use in ongoing treatment or care.
3. For a patient that has been diagnosed with COVID-19, any prescription of a Restricted Drug for treatment of COVID-19:
 - a. shall include written documentation that the patient has been diagnosed with COVID19; and
 - b. shall not:
 - i. exceed a 14-day supply; or
 - ii. whether authorized or unauthorized, be refilled without a new prescription order issued in conformance with this Order.
4. An oral prescription for a Restricted Drug must provide the dispenser with all information required by this Order.
5. This Order does not prevent Restricted Drugs from being:
 - a. administered to patients in accordance with the protocols of a health care facility as defined in § 19-114(d) of the Health-General Article of the Maryland Code ("HG"); or
 - b. used pursuant to the protocol of a clinical trial approved by an institutional review board as defined by HG § 13-2001.
6. This Order remains effective until the state of emergency is terminated and the proclamation of the catastrophic health emergency is rescinded, or until rescinded, superseded, amended, or revised by any subsequent orders.
7. The effect of any statute, rule, or regulation of an agency of the State or a political subdivision inconsistent with this order is hereby suspended.

18 Self Isolation: means sick or tested positive -3 since last reported

Weather:

Friday 57-40 cloudy, Sat 55-39 rain, Sunday 66-48 cloudy

Analysis note: Warm weather will likely mean more people outside, increasing the probability of gatherings. Rainy weather will drive people into their residences. The potential for increased calls for police service exists.

Local:

No stores visited this am:

Analysis note: Beef, poultry, and pork plants continue to close at an alarming rate. This will put pressure on the meat market and likely cause a run on store inventories as the press continues to cover these closures.

A fire Station in Charles County was temporally closed due to a presence of a positive person in the station. Station was cleaned and reopened within 4 hours.

Nursing home and assistant living patients and staff make-up over 1/3 of the total number of positive cases reported in Charles County.

Maryland Update:

Gov. announces recovery plan

State wide order to wear masks in public

Calvert assigns residents shopping days

4 counties have now passed mask ordinances.

PGDOC reports 14 inmates and 13 officers have tested positive.

Region:

Over 10,343 cases in the NCR as of 0500 4-16-2020,

18,729 cases in Maryland, DC, and Virginia as of 1100 on 4-15-2020.

DC expands the stay-at-home order through May 15th

VA extends the stay-at-home order through May 8th

National:

Nursing home deaths and infection rates have dominated the local and national news over the last 24 hours. It was noted the first 6 minutes of a local station's 6 PM news broadcast was devoted to nursing home issues.

Several banks in the US are reporting system outages as users try to access stimulus deposits.

These include: BB&T, US Bank, Navy Federal Credit Union, TD Bank, Citizens Bank, and Atlantic Union Bank. Locally, CBTC mobile system is down. Many of the outages are affecting online and mobile platforms.

Sam's club announces "Hero Hours" every Sunday from 8-10AM for responders. Membership is not required.

NYC is reclassifying over 3700 deaths as COVID deaths. These are people who passed away with symptoms but were not tested.

Local critical infrastructure:

No outages or disruptions are reported or are appear to be likely as of today.

Predications/ Analysis:

- FOIA and PIA requests for detailed records on infections in assisted living and nursing homes will increase as investigative reporting on this issue increases.
- Grocery stores could become a hotbed of fear and anxiety due to limiting numbers of patrons, assigning shopping days, mask requirements, and now limited meat supplies.
- As critical case in Charles County remain low (outside of nursing homes and assisted living homes), needs in other local jurisdictions are growing. Resources should be prioritized and plans should be made to share/deploy critical resources, personnel, and/or facility space to meet the needs regionally.
- The longer this crisis continues the more likely we are to experience critical events that may not be related to the COVID crisis (incidents within the incident). Those in leadership positions need to be prepared to step into dual leadership/managerial roles at a moment's notice. This requires taking care of yourself and staying up on the latest tactics, strategies and knowledge.
- Planning for crisis recovery starts as soon as the crisis begins. Monday marks the 8th weeks of this crisis, 6th week of schools being closed. Partners and stakeholders should begin planning for what the return to the "new normal" looks like in their organization. Sharing of these plans will help each organization build more comprehensive processes.
- Over the weekend the US will likely eclipse 500,000 cases and 15,000 deaths. Md numbers will likely pass 5000 and 150 fatalities by Friday. These numbers will cause increased pressure to ratchet up rhetoric re: "stay at home orders" and could result in further sanctions and restrictions.
- As the confirmed case numbers continue to rapidly ascend the likelihood of jurisdictions issuing "travel bans" increases. Law enforcement should begin researching the constitutionality of these potential edicts and have plans in place for implantation and begin to develop a public communication strategy. Standardizing local "travel authorization documentation" should be explored by the lead jurisdiction having authority.
- Due to diverted attention, the international and domestic terrorism threat is rapidly increasing. Responders should be reminded to remain vigilant and of the DHS guidelines for spotting suspicion activities and terrorism indicators.
- As we enter into the reported peak of this situation communication, along with sharing of individual branch capability and capacity is more important now than ever. "We don't know what we are going to need to know until we need to know it."

- First responder organizations should begin surveying members for pre-existing conditions and other complicating medical conditions. Responders found to have pre-existing conditions should be placed in limited citizen contact roles.
- A review of the 179 countries that report COVID-19 cases, only two (South Korea and China) have somewhat “flattened the curve” of NEW infections. Both showed flattening roughly 30 to 45 days after the initial spikes. The initial spike in the US began around 3-18-2020.
- Reduced stability in the supply chain along with increased fear and anxiety can be expected with today’s “stay at home order.”
- After 3 weeks of social distancing and schools being closed non-english speaking communities within Charles County are likely feeling further isolated due to a lack of language specific communications. Direct and increased messaging to Spanish speakers is likely necessary.
- As mass transit continues to shrink in availability, plans should be made to ensure those who rely on it for essential supplies and trips have delivery resources.
- LE and EMS screening protocols should include questions about recent travel to NY, NJ, CT, and FL.
- Immediate attention is needed to direct companies and organization on the proper processes and appropriate contact to use (Donation Manager at the EOC) to donate PPE and cleaning materials to essential personnel
- The next 7 days will likely see a stabilization of a majority of the grocery supply chain. However, the potential for disruption moving forward continues to remain high.
- FOIA and PIA request from media and citizens groups will likely begin to increase the longer this event lasts. “New normal” processes need to be established as soon as possible.
- Lack of child care options will likely add to family stress. Additional resources, activity and options are needed.
- JIC staff should substantially amplify community resource communications
- As we enter the 2nd week of social distancing stress, anxiety, and fear will likely increase. Continuous reminders of patience and focusing on kindness will become increasingly important.
- Many stores restock overnight. Seniors and the vulnerable populations should be strongly encouraged to shop during the early morning hours when supplies are likely to be at their highest.
- As testing increased the confirmed cases in MD will increase. This will likely cause additional life restrictions.
- Supply chain issues will continue and likely increase as further life interruptions and travel restrictions are ordered. The possibility of violence increases as stress increases, especially at grocery stores.
- Commanders of responders and essential staff should have robust plans for potential quarantines and updated continuity of operations including plans for diminished manpower. Further, responder organizations should begin reviewing existing integration plans with the National Guard.

- Obtaining medical supplies and PPE will continue to be an issue for the foreseeable future. All services should use the command ordering process so orders can be tracked.
- The community of Charles County is showing increased signs of pulling together and assisting one another. The JIC should continue to encourage civility and increase positive press of good news stories occurring throughout our community.
