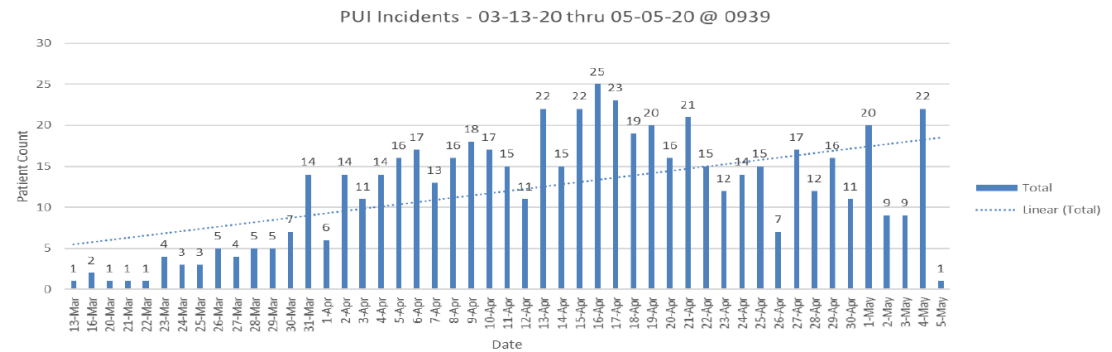

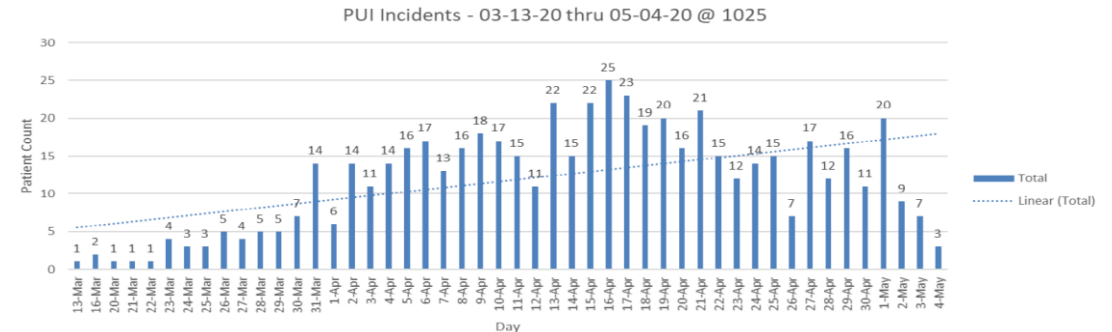

Community Services:	SAFAH update (vouchers for homeless): DCS has received a 7 total SAFAH referrals from Lifestyles, representing 8 homeless individuals (one referral included 2 adults in the family unit). - Five referrals are complete, and all 5 clients were notified by phone that their vouchers are available to use now. Follow-up notices will be provided by the Housing Authority in writing to each voucher recipient, as well. - One referral is in process, as Housing is awaiting 1 essential document from the client, which DCS expects to receive this week. The voucher should be approved & the client notified by COB Thurs 5/7. - Unfortunately, one referral was categorically ineligible because the client(s) household income exceeds the maximum amount for voucher eligibility. Lifestyles:	Food services <i>Eight (8) cabanas operated today as well as curbside distributions. Providing 115 meals and 30 toiletry bags. Volunteers will prepare another 1500 grocery bags will be prepared for distribution this week.</i> <i>Meal deliveries: There were 675 meals provided for 45 families at the New Hope COG cabana today. Families received 3 meals a day for 5 days.</i> Outreach Maryland Diaper Bank <i>Lifestyles of Maryland will partner with Maryland Diaper Bank as a Diaper Hub to support COVID relief efforts.</i> <i>Homeless calls received last evening resulted in Sherriff's office transporting client to shelter. Outreach numbers will not be provided until tomorrow. DSS joined LifeStyles for Street Outreach. This allows for additional services immediately for unsheltered individuals. ICU census is 13, 7 isolation rooms occupied, 19 confirmed positives, 12 PUI admissions, 7 on ventilators with 13 not in use and 28 COVID-19 related deaths. EMS transported 1 PUI and 1 tested positive yesterday. Out of 1,062 tested patients in the hospital, only 235 have come back positive.</i>

Several employees reached out later on after receiving their bags to express their appreciation again, stating it was a boost they needed. CISM: CISM and Peer Support were provided during the funeral arrangements for Marcus Paxton. Peer Support was provided for approximately 25-30 people. CISM was provided to an individual from a volunteer station during the virtual viewing. CISM was also provided to CCSO for an incident involving an officer shooting. Nine people attended.

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	Concerns: We have referred an additional 2 people for a higher level of care this week. We are continuing to monitor the 2 employees previously referred. As many are expressing their frustrated fatigue of COVID-19, we are working to find ways to help give employees the extra push they need to get through the fatigue. We have been following other hot spots for insight on the mental health portion. One thing many places are starting to see is the increase of suicide rates in health care workers. As things are starting to slow down in hot spots, many are talking about the “emotional crash” of being on heightened alert for so long and then getting to “relax.” We are currently working to update all of suicide prevention information to start providing it proactively.
