

Areas covered: Waldorf two locations and La Plata locations. Coordination with DSS continues. This shared outreach is beneficial to the homeless population. We recently purchased additional laundry vouchers to allow individuals the opportunity to wash their clothing. We continue to provide face coverings to individuals living in encampments who were without. Additional showers were purchased and distributed.</i></p> <p><i>We are coordinating testing for shelters and homeless population with the health department and Angel’s Watch. Plans for testing outcomes are being coordinated to mitigate cross contamination staffing is being scheduled appropriately.
