




All schools, buildings and centers will remain closed to the public.</i></p> <p><b>Instruction:</b></p> <p><i>Nothing new to report.</i></p> <p><i>The final round of learning packets for elementary school students will be at meal sites starting May 28. There are no additional packets for secondary students. Starting on June 1, middle and high school teachers will use Teams for the final two weeks of instruction. Teams lessons are canceled for high school students on the day of their school's in-person graduation event. This includes Henry E. Lackey and Maurice J.
