

The total was -240 from the meals served on Thursday, 6/4/20.</i></p> <p><i>The Summer Meals Program is a free meals program for all children and youth ages 18 and younger who live in Charles County.</i></p> <p><i>Due to the COVID-19 social distancing requirements, Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) will continue to serve Grab and Go meals at our eleven existing meal sites beginning Friday, June 12 through Tuesday, June 30 between the hours of 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. CCPS will serve Summer Meals throughout the summer months until August 14; however, we are awaiting direction from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) regarding our Summer Meals Program beyond June 30.
